



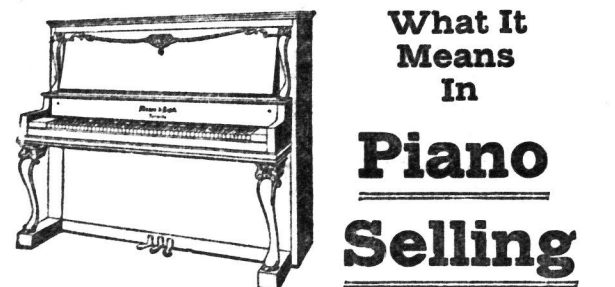

NEW OFFICERS WERE INSTALLED

An Enthusiastic Reception Tendered Major and Mrs. Morris of Salvation Army.
IS A FORMER LONDONER

Major Morris was Here 22 Years Ago—His Life Work Has Been on Behalf of the Army.

A most enthusiastic reception was tendered Major and Mrs. Morris at their installation at the Salvation Army barracks last evening, when practically every member of the organization in this city and district attended to greet the new commanders, who arrived here from their former charge in British Columbia a few days ago.

Cornel Mapp, of Toronto, representing the territorial headquarters, officiated at the installation, and was assisted in this duty by Staff Captain Walton, representing the men officers, spoke enthusiastically, declaring that all would assist in every possible manner in the new work undertaken by Major and Mrs. Morris.

A child of the Army. Major Morris, he said, is a child of the Army, his father having occupied the position which the son is now undertaking in this city some years ago. He also spoke of the fame of the work of the new commanders in British Columbia, which had reached this city before them.

Mrs. Morris was first introduced to the local contingent by Col. Mapp, and in a short address introduced herself to her soldiers. She declared that she had come to like Vancouver so much that she felt great regret in leaving, but added that she had no doubt she would soon have a great regard for London and its people.

Some inkling of the vast work undertaken by Major and Mrs. Morris in the west was given by the former in his address, in which he stated that he and his wife had had charge of all the territory between Lehigh Valley and the Yukon, and north into the Yukon. Over one thousand Indians in uniform had been left there, he said.

The Major stated that he left this city twenty-two years ago, when still a school boy, and now returns a man, with no regrets that he has given the best of his life in the service of the Army.

"Since my return to London I have received many changes," said the Major in his address, "although I viewed with regret the same old Grand Trunk station, that I left twenty-two years ago. I almost feel disgraced as a Londoner now that such a thing should exist, and while we are chiefly interested in religion we are endeavoring to do something to have the station at least improved."

Since leaving London, the Major has travelled over Canada several times, his last charge before going to the Pacific coast being when he succeeded Major and Mrs. McGilvray, now of London, in Newfoundland.

Col. Mapp, in the concluding address, stated that as he has attended over sixty-five farewells, receptions and gatherings of a similar nature during the past five weeks and has travelled over 11,000 miles, he has little left to say in the way of original matter, but he will co-operate with the new commanders here and assist in the development of the Army and its work at every opportunity.

A splendid musical programme was provided by the three bands during the evening.

LAST REGULAR MEETING OF THE CITY COUNCIL

Will Be Held In The City Hall On Monday Night Next.
