The First Lord of the Admiralty ansounced the other day that representtives of the Canadian Government would shortly go to Great Britain to rame a Canadian naval policy in conultation with the Imperial authoriies. He repeated what the Conservaive press of Canada had been saying for months. The contemplated visit of Mr. Borden and Mr. Hazen had London newspapers. The Times had levoted a solemn leader to the expected conference. Mr. Borden, himself, in the late session of Parliament, had hinted at it. Now comes this statement by Mr. Borden himself:

"During the last few months reports have been published respecting a visit by the Prime Minister, the Minister of Marine and others to Britain during the summer. As a matter of fact, they are entirely unauthorized and wholly conjecture. visit has been considered or arranged, except that Foster, who leaves on the 31st inst., to attended the meetings of the Imperial Trade Commission. The cabinet has not yet considered the visit of other members or subjects to be discussed, and reports to the contrary are wholly unauthorized."


