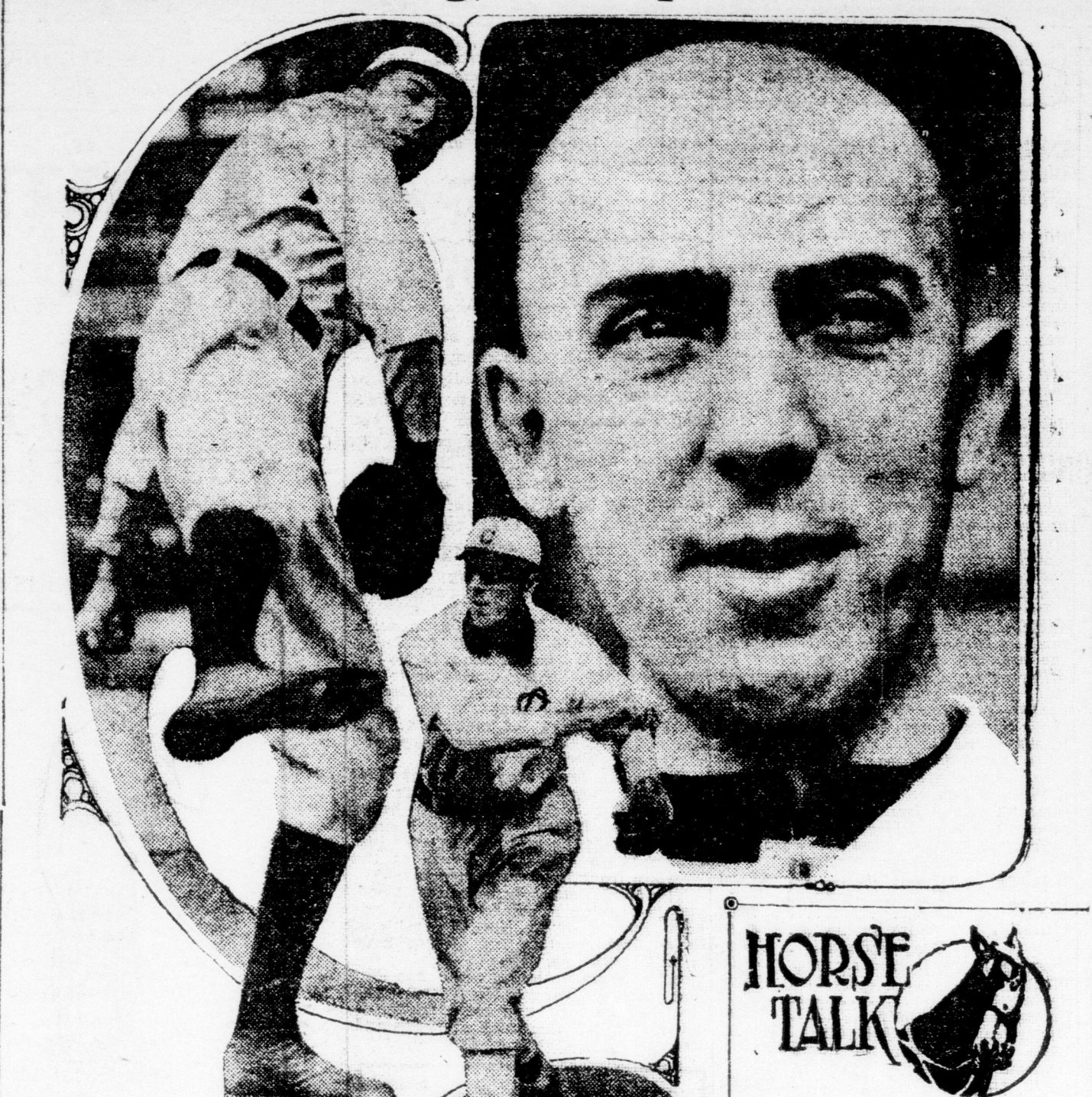

Finally, in the shake-up following Charlie Somers' purchase of the Toledo team as a Cleveland farm, Falkenberg was sent to the American Association team. He had a great season in Toledo, perfecting the fade-away ball, which has had much to do with Christy Mathewson's success.

Falkenberg was called back to Cleveland when Manager Birmingham saw how good he was and this spring has proved to be the star not only of the Cleveland team, but of the American League.
