Eighty years ago a nurse was a

Into this environment, with no thought of personal comfort, Florence Nightingale, member of a distingusihed English amily, voluntarily placed herself. To be of service to others was her notive, but this laudable thought was not entertained by her friends

BLOW UP COAL MINE IN PENNSYLVANIA TOWNSHIP

Believed Strike Sympathizers Are Responsible For Destruction of Peterman Property.

Pittsburg, Pa., May 12.—The Peterman Mine in Pennsylvania Township, near here, was blown up early today by a heavy charge of dynamite which threw stones so far that the farmhouse of George Wessel, almost a quarter of a mile away was damaged. Sheriff Woodside, with big force of deputies, left Pittsburg shortly after 9 a.m. for the mine, where, it was reported, a body of coal strike sympathizers had collect-

Ten minutes after the deputies left Pittsburg, Peterman said over the telephone from his home in Oakmont, Pa., that the men who had attacked his place were hastening in automobiles to the mine of Joseph Schenck, half a mile away. One of the automobiles contained dynamite Peterman said, and members of the crowd said they were going to "get the Schenck mine.'

Peterman said that the men had zone to his mine shortly before day break and planting a heavy charge of dynamite in the mouth of the drift completely destroyed it. They then disappeared, only to gather again, he said. No one was hurt by the explosion.
