

Allies Agree To Invite U. S. To Near East **Peace Parley**

PARIS, Oct. 26.—France, Italy and Great Britain have agreed to invite the United States to participate officially in the Near East peace conference at Lausanne, Switzerland, November 13. This decision was reached after a week's discussion of the form of the invitation to be issued

to the conference. The suggestion to ask the United States to participate officially came from Lord Curzon, the British secretary for foreign affairs. The invitation will be handed to the state department in Washington probably tomorrow by the French, British and Italian embassies.

Quebec, Oct. 26 .- That the government of the Province of Quebec should buy or build breweries, operate them and take full control of the sale of beer, as it does for alcohol and wine, was suggested yesterday in the legislative council by Amyot, in moving the address in reply to the speech from the throne. He held that while the government was responsible for all the excesses which resulted from the too great free dom with which beer was sold, it only received five per cent of the profits from those sales.
