The poultry building is one of the most interesting on the grounds, and the steady stream of people who come out of the building has praise for the manner in which the birds are exhibited and in the unusually high quality of the birds themselves.

As is usual at London fair the pet stock at first seems to outnumber the utility, but this is only a first impression which strikes one on account of the showy nature of the pigeons and bantam fowl which are to be seen.

Among the utility breeds, Barred Rocks are easily the best class, with White Wyandottes as a second. The first cockerel in the Rocks was a wonderful bird, and Richard Oat says that it is not often one sees such perfection in the National or the American State Fairs.

The Wyandotte entries are excellent, and considering the fact that these birds had to be prepared for weeks in advance with a special wash and then blue like white clothes, the showing they make is not only creditable, but marvelous.

The awards in the poultry classes will be available this evening, for although complete at present, they have not been tabulated in book form and turned in to the secretary's office.

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INSULIN PROVING
OF UNTOLD VALUE
IN DISTRICT CASES

First Consignment of Drug To Reach City Has Been Distributed.

SUPPLY INCREASES

The first consignment of insulin ever used in London for indigent patients arrived at the local public health laboratory last week. Approximately 6,000 units were sent here from Toronto. As soon as the substance came to hand it was distributed among local physicians who had previously made application for the fluid to administer to destitute diabetics.

Now that the marvellous tonic can be obtained gratuitously by diabetes sufferers, hundreds of stricken citizens of Western Ontario can look forward to years of life and comparative comfort. Dozens of diabetic patients are present in Victoria Hospital where tests are being made to determine each one's capacity for taking insulin. Instruction regarding proper diet and courses of treatment is being given for the purpose of teaching diabetics how to administer insulin themselves. Already hundreds of persons in this section of the province are able to treat themselves without a physician's aid through at Victoria.

Only four other laboratories in Canada have been forwarded supplies of insulin for indigent patients. Owing to the relatively small quantities in which the drug in manufacture it will be impossible to give more than a two week's supply at one time. As the supply gives out, however, doctors representing indigent patients are able to make application for more, and another two week's ration will be furnished.

According to Dr. Albert Black of the Institute of Public Health, the local laboratory will be able to dispense a whole month's supply as soon as larger quantities are portioned out. He expects this will come about before the new year. In the meantime, the city is able to take care of every one afflicted with the malady.

Medical men must make out a form certifying to the indigence of patients desiring the drug before a portion will be given. Before the consignment was shipped to this city local physicians were communicating with the Toronto Department of Health and instructions regarding the proper administration of the drug were circulated all over Western Ontario. Seven hundred doctors from this section have taken courses in the Queen City in connection with the diabetes treatment as applied to insulin and the majority are well informed on the subject at the present time. The circulars describing treatment were distributed mainly for the purpose of explaining the subject to country practitioners without facilities for learning it any other way.

Diabetics who contemplate insulin treatment are warned that it will be in their interests to enter Victoria Hospital for a period of two weeks or a month before receiving the drug. This plan was suggested so patients would be given an opportunity of learning how the drug should be administered and what dietary restrictions should be employed. The arrangement has been so successful that now hundreds of sufferers are able to treat themselves without medical assistance.

Periodic consignments of the wonderful fluid will arrive in London every week. As time goes on Dr. Black believes the allotments will become larger and the price greatly reduced. The cost of administering the average amount of insulin now necessary in the treatment of an advanced case is from 60 cents to 90 cents a day. This is considered remarkably cheap when it is realized that a year or so ago the drug was about five times as expensive.

GOVERNOR RELATES HOW PRISON GUARDS FRUSTRATED SCHEME TO ESCAPE.

PROPOSAL OF GREER DOES NOT SUIT MAYOR

"Pinch Penny Economist" His Worship's Reply to City Hall Suggestion.

Alderman John Greer is somewhat of a "pinch penny economist," in the opinion of Mayor Wenig, who suggests that the city councilors would be ill-advised to follow the suggestion to remodel the old city hall at a probable expenditure of from \$20,000 to \$25,000.

The mayor feels impelled to remark that Alderman Greer does not "give the ratepayers credit for having average intelligence." The people evidently do not know what they desire, talking about or what they desire, according to Alderman Greer, the mayor points out. They do not know their own mind, if Alderman Greer is correct, he says.

"They said quite distinctly that they want the new city hall on the old site," the mayor stated. "And as soon as possible under the circumstances. Yet we find Alderman Greer saying 'no you don't want a new city hall at all, you want to fix over the old one.' Alderman Greer, down a sewer, as it were."

"I am more than surprised with Alderman Greer's financial advice," he says, in effect, "in his position, retrenchment. Why, that is just the very opposite attitude for a businessman, or for any other citizen to adopt."

"Just think of it. In a period of depression, retrenchment. Why that is why we encounter the so-called financial panic from time to time. Someone starts the rumor that there are hard times ahead. Then some person says 'I owe \$50, but I had better not pay that for a while until I see how things go.' Then the person who is waiting for the \$50 says 'I can't get my money to pay that \$50 I owe. I had better not pay that money ahead.' And so on down the line. The first thing one knows we are in the old one."

What causes panics? People refused to place their money in circulation. What causes good times again? Everything starts spending. Get the cents a day. In the business world I spend more money in advertising and exploitation than when times are good. I do not have to do it when times are good. Alderman Greer has, in my opinion, adopted an ill-advised attitude."

LEAGUE OF NATIONS ADOPT WATCHFUL WAITING POLICY

Associated Press Despatch. Geneva, Sept. 10.—Watchful waiting, for the moment at least, was considered to be the policy of the League of Nations regarding the Greco-Italian conflict.

This was deduced from the position of a telegram which Count Lohr, president of the council, sent to the council of ambassadors, saying that the council of the league would see the dispute settled as soon as possible.

The message voiced the council's hesitancy, and the documents forwarded by it to the Paris body were useful, and asked to be kept informed on any results of the decision taken and any discussions which might still take place.

This telegram, communicated to all the delegates to the assembly here, was interpreted as confirming the impression earlier prevalent that for the moment the assembly would content itself with awaiting developments in the Greco-Italian conflict.

The general sentiment at Geneva is that the entire dispute would be immensely clarified if the Italian government would issue an order immediately for the withdrawal of the troops from Corfu and the restoration of the other islands to Greece.

Special Cable to The London Advertiser. Paris, Sept. 11.—Capitulation by Germany is regarded in France as imminent, one journal—L'Intelligence—usually regarded as conservative, goes so far as to predict it will occur within a few days.

In fact, says L'Intelligence, negotiations may already have started in Berlin between Chancellor Stresemann and other cabinet ministers, which leave no doubt that the German leaders wish to come to terms with France, if they can.

The statement made by Stresemann, to the effect that Germany realizes now that she lost the war, causes pleasure here. Such a statement, however, displaces the Quai d'Orsay, the propaganda experts saying they did not believe in the impression that France is forcing Germany to her knees and making her swallow unpalatable conditions. They wish to spare, in measure, the susceptibilities of the German government. The word "Denouement," or the phrase, "Return to reason," is preferred by the propaganda experts.
