## SOME FACTS OF WHITE PLAGUE

Editor News Record.

Dear Sir:

Few of the citizens of Berlin are aware of the following facts. Nearly 2,000,000 people die yearly of consumption. Canada's portion of that number is about 13,500. At least 10,000 persons are now suffering with active consumption in Ontario, and more than twice that number are infected and in need of treatment. It is estimated that more than 150,000 of the present population of Ontario will die of consumption, which takes away more than 2,500 yearly. By the enforcement of hygiene and sanitary laws, the death rate has been materially reduced in the past 25 years: first by raising the general health to a point of successful resistance and second by an organized fight against the tubercle bacillus, without which there would be no consumption. The primary and absolutely essential cause of consumption is the tubercle bacillus, from whence the name tuberculosis. No matter how unsanitary people live, under which conditions tuberculosis thrives, or how much they abuse their minds and bodies, unless the tubercle bacillus gets into the human body and there multiplies, there will be no tuberculosis. Therefore, the first active thought in regard to tuberculosis is "prevention," with every effort for the cure of those afflicted. The best experience has proved conclusively, that the most successful treatment of tuberculosis is for the best, first, because it limits the spread of the disease and second because it results in the permanent permanent cures. There are about 15 sanatoriums in Ontario, and soon join the ranks of those who have been required at a hospital, based on the line of the Galt and Preston R.R. on which will be built equipped and maintained a hospital for the care and treatment of such as suffer from tuberculosis.

One of all citizens of Berlin is earnestly requested to help along this most humanitarian project. May the law now be submitted to the people of Berlin and carried.

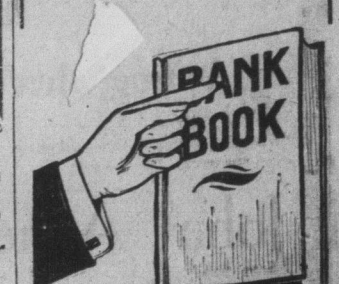

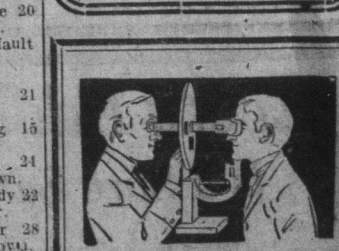

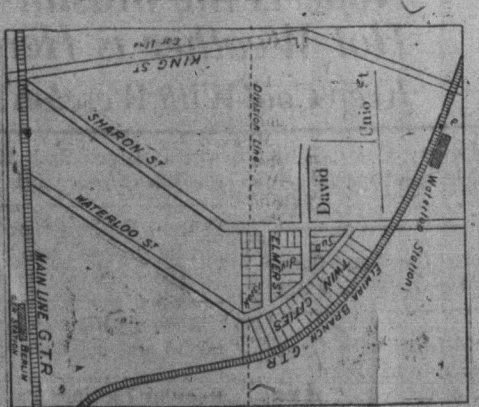
