STRUCK BY A TIDAL WAVE.

Passengers and Crew of the SS. Ten-
tonic Have a Rough Experience.

New York, Feb. 28.—The White Star
Line steamship *Ten-tonic*, which ar-
rived this morning from Liverpool,
was struck by a tidal wave at 9:20
o'clock on Sunday morning, and, as
a consequence, came to port with
her forward ironwork bent and smash-
ed, and some of the passengers and
crew under the doctor's care. The

Capt. McKinstry was in the chart
room, and the first officer was on the
bridge. The wave broke high, throw-
ing down the men in the cross of the
captain. The officers on the bridge held on for
life. John Michaelson, a Dane, 25
years of age, a steerage passenger,
was caught by the wave and carried
along the deck. His foot caught in a
deck fixture and was wrenched from
its socket. Dr. Dobie, the ship's
surgeon, was forced to amputate the
foot. The saloon passengers took up
a collection for the unfortunate man
and raised \$129. S. C. Wilkeson, Esq.,
a cabin passenger, was thrown
against the rail and his jaw broken.

A HEAD-ON COLLISION.

Two Men Killed and Three Badly
Injured.

Pittsburg, Feb. 28.—Two dead, three
badly hurt, and a passenger train
burned, is the result of a head-on col-
lision between passenger train No. 16,
south-bound, and a local freight on
the Pittsburg, Virgin & Charleston
Railroad this evening at Coal Valley.

ville, leg burned off, hurt internally,
died on way to hospital.
Injured—C. Shaver, fireman, Union-
town, badly scalded and bruised;
Charles Trond, baggage-master, bruise-
d and burned; Michael J. Schoen-
berger, a passenger, back hurt.
None of the passengers were hurt
beyond minor cuts and bruises. Im-
mediately after the collision the pas-
senger cars took fire, and soon were
totally demolished, only one car
escaping the flames.
