DEAD AT NINETY-TWO

DRUMMOND COUNTY DEAL

The debate on the Drummond County railway matter today was marked by the admission by Mr. Blair that the present bargain is better than the former one by at least \$6,000 a year. This is the first time the government has admitted that there is any substantial difference in the two contracts. Incidentally it came out that Mr. Blair did not know whether or not the contract bound the government to purchase the remaining stock of the Drummond county railway. This is a matter of \$5,000 or thereabouts.

DYNAMITE IN THE TRANSVAAL

Curt Refusal of the British Demand That Monopoly Shall Cease. Bloemfontein, June 1.—Among the most important points that President Kruger of the Transvaal Republic and Sir Alfred Milner, Governor of Cape Colony and British high commissioner for South Africa, will have to discuss at their conference here in regard to the demands of the Uitlanders, will be the question of the dynamite monopoly, under which the Uitlanders are groaning, and which the British secretary of state for the colonies has used his utmost endeavors to remedy.

PROFESSORS' ENGAGEMENTS TERMINATED

Quebec, May 31.—The professors of Morrill College have been notified that their services will not be required after the expiration of the collegiate year 1899-1900. It is not believed that there is any intention of closing the institution but it was deemed advisable to give the notice because the expenditure is at present very much greater than the revenue.

MANITOBA AND NORTHWEST

C. P. R. Land Selling at Great Rate—Changes in Railway Staff. Winnipeg, May 31.—Ex-Governor Mackintosh of the Northwest Territories arrived in Winnipeg today on his way to Rosland. Mr. Mackintosh said he was well pleased with the financial prospects of his company as their operations were proving successful. He declined to discuss the political situation, saying he was out of politics for the time being.

KILLED IN SHIPYARD

Berlin, May 31.—The director of the Germania ship-building yards at Kiel, Herr Hazan, fell today from the baronial platform of the Emperor Kaiser Wilhelm, which is to be launched tomorrow, and was instantly killed. One of the engineers, a man named Krantz, was killed by the falling of an elevator.

WOMAN'S MURDER

London, June 2.—The Queen's Birthday honors announced today include one Canadian, Chancellor Boyd, of the Ontario High Court, who is knighted. Sir Charles Howard Vincent, M.P., and Mr. James Rennell Rodd, secretary of the British consular general in Egypt, are made Knight Commanders of St. Michael and St. George. In the case of Mr. Rodd the honor is bestowed as a reward for his successful mission to Abyssinia in 1897. Sir Charles Howard Vincent was honored for his services during the recent anarchist conference at Rome.

CHICAGO STREET RAILWAYS

Chicago, June 2.—Stockholders of the north and west Chicago street railway companies today voted to lease the two systems to the Chicago Union Traction Company, a concern formed by a number of New York capitalists. During the meeting President Charles T. Yerkes announced his retirement as an active official of the Chicago Street Railway Company. The company has an authorized capitalization of \$35,000,000.

ALBERNI'S LATEST

Report of Gold-Bearing Ledge Exposed in a Cave. Alberni, B. C., June 1.—William Morgan, a miner, who has been working at Hayes' Camp brings the news that on May 24th, while working on a new lead about 12 feet from the surface he put in a shot. None of the debris coming out was nonplussed and upon investigation found that the inner portion of the mound was hollow and formed a cave.

STATISTICS FOR MAY

The duty collected in Vancouver for May was \$81,860, some \$12,000 more than the export for May last year. The duty on imports was \$238,702, and the exports \$46,690. During May 64 vessels entered inwards and 140 outwards. One hundred and twenty-seven cases were tried in the police court last month.

STANFORD'S MANY MILLIONS

San Francisco, June 2.—S. W. Loeb, president of the Stanford University trustees, is quoted as saying that the property assessed to the institution by Mrs. Stanford is worth \$38,000,000 and could be converted into \$15,000,000 cash. Mrs. Stanford's remaining property will eventually become part of the university endowment.

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
