

Chicago Dec. 30.—The receipts of flour here for the past year exceeded last year's by fifty per cent. The receipts of grain decreased 15 per cent. The arrivals of hogs and cattle were smaller than the last year, and sheep larger. The number o shogs slaughtered decreased half a million. Heavy speculation in oats was a marked feature of the grain trade, and there were some heavy losses.


