THE COLLISION OF A RAILWAY

LONDON, July 8.—Emperor William this
afternoon took leave of the Queen and left
for London, where he will occupy a suite of
apartments at Buckingham Palace. The
chief of the Emperor's visit to
London was to present this evening
at the grand "Command" per-
formance at the Royal Italian Opera.

The gala opera performance on which

London. The interior of the theatre
was lavishly festooned with roses, and on
the front of each of the two hundred boxes
was a bouquet of flowers thrown into a
rose. Several thousand pounds were
spent for flowers alone.

The royal box, consisting of boxes thrown into a
rose located at the centre of the first tier, was
a yellow and gold suite, surmounted by an
enormous Frisian eagle. The audience was
composed of the best known of the
aristocracy. The men were in uniform, or
court dress. The women were in
diamonds. The display of jewels was un-
precedented. It was after 9 o'clock when the
Emperor and the Empress arrived at the
theatre.

Tomorrow the Emperor and his party and
the Royal Italian Opera will give the "Golden
Legend" at the Albert Hall, and the same
day the Imperial travelling company will
depart for London. The great event for
London of the Emperor's visit will be the
passage from Buckingham Palace to the
next of the Emperor and his party on their
route to Guild Hall. Business along
the route of the procession will be locally
suspended, and windows overlooking the
route are being high priced.

FREE SUGAR PREVENTS THE
GRANTING OF SUBSIDIES.

A Deputation Waits on the Government

OTTAWA, July 8.—A deputation consisting

Mr. Carpenter. They asked for the usual
allowance of \$200 a mile over the 35 miles from
Hamilton to Toronto. They said the Govern-
ment had already recognized the
road by bounting it as far as Hamilton.
Construction without additional aid, that
