LONDON, July 8-A balloon which wa London was to be present this even-ing at7 the grand "Command" performance at the Royal Italian Opera, The gala opera performance this evening was the finest spectacle ever, witnessed in London. The interior of the opera house sent up to-day from the grounds on which the Naval Exhibition is being held encountered a storm after ascending to a con siderable height and feil on Bepley Heath. It struck a cottage with great force and partially wrecked the building. An inmate of the cottage named Lee was buried under the balloon and was nearly suffocated by the escaping gas before he was rescued.
