A Colony Organized to seek a New Home in Paraguay.

YANCOONER, B.C. Aug. 11.—The steamship Niagara brings word that a large mass meeting in Sydney July 13 had a sympathetic farewell to members of a colony organized to go to Paraguay to start a new Australia.

All seemed to be in good health and suited to undergo the hardships and trials of pioneer life in a new country.

English Soldiers Coming

WHEAT NEARLY 3 CENTS UP

UNFAVORABLE CROP NEWS IS THE CHIEF BULL ARGUMENT

New York Stocks Irregular—Local Securities Hold Steady—Money Firm in the Local Market—Local and Foreign Grain Markets—Cotton Higher

September wheat in Chicago advanced 2 1/2 cents yesterday from the low point of the previous day. The unfavorable crop report and a more cheerful feeling among financial men were the strengthening features.

Bar silver is steady in New York at 75c per ounce.

According to the United States Government report the wheat crop in the United States this year will be about 1,000,000 bushels less than that of last year.

C.P.R. holds steady in London and on the Canadian Exchanges.

The corn crop in the United States, as indicated by the August report, will be shorter by 100,000,000 bushels, as indicated by the Government reports a month ago.
