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CHANGE SCHEDULE OF LOCAL TRAINS

G. T. R. and C. P. R. Announce Changed Time-Tables. Changes will be made in the passenger train service of the Grand Trunk and Canadian Pacific railways commencing Monday, May 1, 1921.

Vocational Guidance Lecture At Y. M. C. A. Anna Edson Taylor Succumbs In Niagara Hospital.

LOCKPORT, N. Y., April 29.—Anna Edson Taylor, the only woman who ever navigated Niagara Falls in a barrel and lived, died in the Niagara County Hospital today.

Mrs. Taylor made the trip over the falls on October 24, 1901, in a crudely constructed wooden barrel as a cast at a fortune, but ill-fortune pursued her from the time of her adventure to the time of her death. She was 58 years old.

Mrs. Taylor was towed out from La Salle, two miles above the falls, by rivermen into the Canadian channel, so that her barrel would pass over the Horseshoe Falls, where the water was deepest. Her barrel passed safely through the upper rapids, made the plunge near the middle of the Horseshoe and reappeared in the spume below the falls within half an hour.

Mrs. Taylor was severely injured and it was necessary to cut the barrel in halves to get her out. While she was receiving medical attention her barrel was stolen.

The result of the discussion which appeared in The Free Press last fall on this question, the board decided that the grocers were not paying a fair return to the board, and the rental was considerably increased this year. The outcome is that the grocers have refused to pay the increase and the spaces will be rented directly by the fair board.

Last year the board would not small amount of profit out of this building. At the time it was pointed out that the board should not allow such conditions to continue. It was urged that all profits should accrue to the benefit of the fair. This was resented at the time by some of the directors, who asserted that the grocers could handle the building to their advantage than the fair board could.
