(Galt Reporter) The sad news of the death of Jthm Malcolm MacKay, B.A., mathemath al master at the Collegiate Institute, which occurred shortly after four o'clock Tues-day afternoon, will be received with the greatest regret by all classes of citizens. Deceased had taught his classes as usual Tuesday morning and left the school at noon accompanied by Mr. G. P. Keys and crossed the campus to Water street. As they reached the sidewalk they were about to part to go to their respective homes, when Mr. Keys noticed Mr. Mc-Kay drag his leg and gradually sink. homes, when Mr. Keys noticed Mr. Mc-Kay drag his leg and gradually sink. Mr. Keys immediately went to his assistance and grabbed him, Mr. McKay remarking "I feel strange," and then collapsed completely. Some school boys were summoned who procured a stretcher and the prostrate man was carried to his home at 38 Samuelson street. By this time he had become unconscious. Principal Gundry immedi-ately summoned medical aid, but in spite of everything possible being done, he passed away shortly after 4 o'clock. The immediate cause of his death was paralysis. paralysis. Deceased was born in West Zorra near Embro, and began teaching in East Nissouri, afterwards in Middlemiss and Dutton. He became principal of the Kincardine High School, from which place he came to the Galt Collegiate

Institute four years ago as mathematical master, a position he has filled with the greatest efficiency and satisfaction to the greatest emciency and satisfaction to the Board. In religion he was a Presbyter-ian and a member of Knox Church. It was his custom to spend his vacation with his brother William, on the farm in East Nissouri, being a man who was fond of country life and a lover of nature. 

As a first step to bringing before the public the importance of means for the training of younger men to take up foreign trade work, the Trade Commission has written to all the Canadian universities asking if they can give their immediate support by establishing, this summer, short courses for business men and students featuring especially aspects of foreign trade.

It is believed this matter will be enthusiastically taken up by younger men and women anxious to secure an opening in life which will apparently not be overcrowded and which will develop in importance as trade of the Dominion increases.
