MR. DUKE:None-the-less, it is true that you do have Economic problems. I want to ask you about a statement you made in a recent speech in which you suggested that one of Canada's difficulties is that it is viewed too often as a 97-pound weakling.

What did you mean by that?

MINISTER LALONDE: Well, we have problems,
economically, but one of our problems -- inside Canada
even more than outside of Canada -- is that we tend to take a
rather despondent view of ourselves. There has been
a lack of confidence in the Canadian economy, inside,
among the Canadians, themselves; and a lack of confidence
about the future of our Country. Again, it is a selffulfilling wish. If you think you are weak, you will be
weak! If you think you are strong, you will be strong!

When I made that particular statement, I said,

"Look at the basic strength of the Canadian economy—

and the immense wealth that we have-not only in terms of

resources, but in terms of people, too."

There is no reason to be fearful about the future.

Gosh -- we are one of the most fortunate

Countries in the World!

MR. ANDERSON: One of the things that strikes the eye down here is the Canadians sitting in their snow drift up north of the Boundary, constantly complaining about
