Mr. Lapierre: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, but when a sentence starts with the words "Est-ce—", that means it is a question. Could the Prime Minister inform the House why he has misled the House and Canadians? May I ask him why he doesn't correct this bad habit of exaggerating?

Hon. Benoît Bouchard (Minister of Employment and Immigration): Mr. Speaker, the Hon. Member for Shefford wants statistics. He will have them. What the people of Manicouagan have heard today is that 38 per cent of the people of a riding, who in 1984 received part of their income from unemployment insurance are not people—

Mr. Lapierre: Answer the question!

Mr. Bouchard: I let you ask your question—let me answer it. I am trying to understand the Hon. Member's logic. Thirty-eight per cent of the population of a riding, plus people on welfare, or the labour force, if you prefer, plus people receiving

welfare, plus people who are no longer seeking employment, isn't that enough to want to take care of what your hon. colleague called regional disparity? Even in the riding of the Prime Minister of Canada, we have to take care of—

Mr. Speaker: Order, please. The Hon. Member for Shefford (Mr. Lapierre).

Hon. Benoît Bouchard (Minister of Employment and Immigration): Of course, Mr. Speaker, when the Government... I am trying to see the logic of the New Democratic Party. You want us to help regions that need help. In the riding of Manicouagan, we are dealing with an employment situation known to everybody in Quebec. Everybody knows the North Shore is one of the worst off areas in terms of jobs. And Members opposite are to blame. So what else can we
