

Canadian Lawn Bowlers Play 36 Games in 6 Weeks

BOWLERS TO PLAY 36 GAMES ABROAD

Opening in London on June 14
With the E. B. A.—
Facts About the
Tour.

The Canadian lawn-bowling team that plays in the Old Country in June and July will have a busy six weeks abroad. Capt. Thos. Rennie and his 30 players sail from Montreal on the Victorian June 5, arriving June 13 in Liverpool. Their first game will be on Saturday, June 14, with the executive of the English Bowling Association in London. The following week will also be spent mostly in the metropolis.

The team plays the first and second weeks in England, the third in Wales, the fourth and fifth in Scotland, and the sixth in Ireland. They expect to play six games each week or 36 games in all.

It was originally intended to play five rink matches, but six rinks a side will likely be the order.

The team is a particularly strong one, and has been chosen without a hitch. It will be an expensive tour, costing fully \$7000 per man. Everyone has signed up and his passage booked. Thirty ladies will accompany the party.

The schedule will close so as to return on the Corsican, which leaves Liverpool on July 26, the fully half the company will remain a week longer, sailing Aug. 1 on the Virginian.

ANOTHER LACROSSE WAR IS STARTING

Con Jones and the D. L. A.
Are Striving to Arrange
Peace.

Con Jones arrived back here yesterday from his trip east and his thoughts and actions clearly showed that he was worried. With all his pet ideas about him and a lacrosse commission so far removed that it begins to look hopeless, then dispatches proclaim that Westminister and George Kennedy of the Irish-Canadians have begun to fling the gold dust about for lacrosse players to grab. Con figures that if it once gets started well that coast team will not materialize when the season opens. Donbue and Marshall have been offered big inducements to go to Westminister, and Kennedy is burning up the Spring Bros. and Johnny Howard of Westminister.

Jones is willing to carry out his agreement with the D.L.A. to the letter, but would like the "Big Four" to leave Westminister alone until after he receives definite word in regard to whether Westminister intends to join hands with the D.L.A. or not.

President Quinn of the D.L.A. has called the meeting of the league for next Wednesday instead of a week from Saturday. It is thought that, after the D.L.A. meet on Saturday and either decide to drop out of lacrosse or go back to the amateur ranks, Westminister will fall in line and join hands with the D.L.A. and Vancouver.

Jones is determined that the agreement will go thru and if Westminister does not come in they will play by themselves and they will also lose the \$5000 which they are to be paid for the two games in Victoria.

If Westminister have any sense they will likely take a tumble to themselves before the meeting next Wednesday and ease up Mr. Lally and the N.L.U. and get together with the only professional league in the east.

Jones left for New York last night, but will return in time for the meeting Wednesday.

LEAF SECURE AN INFILDER

Maranville of Boston Nationals
Is the Man—Schlafly Gets
Bobby Vaughn—
Notes.

NEW YORK, April 11.—(Can. Press.)—Manager Kelley of the Toronto team, after a conference here tonight with Manager Stallings of the Boston Nationals, announced that he had arranged to secure an infilder from the Braves. The new Torontoan is a fast young fellow who attracted Kelley's attention when he and the Braves were training together at Macon. He is a sensational ground coverer and thrower and ought to hit close to .300 in the International League. Kelley will not divulge the name of the newcomer until he reports to Toronto, which will be in about ten days.

Fred Mitchell, the former Toronto player, who is coaching the Boston team, recommended the newcomer very highly. Manager Larry Schlafly of the Jersey City team, also a former Leaf, tonight closed with the Newark Club for the purchase of Bobby Vaughn, the one-time Toronto shortstop. Vaughn was sold to St. Paul, but had trouble with the management over salary and was turned back to Newark. Schlafly admits that his team is not strong, but he is confident that the fielding in Bermuda. Toronto will take the field on opening day at Newark, with about four of the squad in good condition.

The infilder referred to is likely Maranville, who was the star in the opening game for Boston against the Giants. President McCaffery saw Maranville in action and was very much taken with his work.

Rain played havoc with big league ball, and all the National League fixtures scheduled had to be postponed. The American League played two out of four games carded.

PROFESSIONAL SOCCER UNION

Toronto and Hamilton Teams
Find Difficulty in Securing
Grounds—Ottawa and
Montreal Preparing.

The Interprovincial Professional Football Union is not making very rapid strides in Upper Canada, although Ottawa and Montreal report some very decided steps. The two teams in Toronto—the Queen City and the Rapids—have yet only exist on paper, but both managers declare that if grounds could be secured it would be a simple matter to get the players out. That season to be the club and the officers of the league will have to step lively if they want to secure any of the likely playing areas in Toronto. Both managers claim to have signed up players, but refuse to divulge their names, so if they did not make good, they could still retain their standing in the U. F. A.

The vagueness that prevails does not seem to warrant very much enthusiasm regarding the venture locally, until the players begin practices, at least. Small pay is also considered a serious obstacle to play on, and a player will have to have some other means of livelihood besides football to be able to live.

In Hamilton the position is practically the same as in Toronto, as the grounds are still the bone of contention. They have players in abundance, but no regular field to play on. Last week the directors of Britannia Park, owned by Alerts (Limited), refused to consider their offers and gave the park up to amateurs for the season. The only other place in the town that fills the requirements is the baseball ground, and it is hardly likely that they will be able to get any dates there.

In both Hamilton and Toronto the new project has found considerable opposition, and they realize that they will have an uphill battle before they can get anything running. Local enthusiasts assert that if centrally located grounds were secured it must pay, but at present they are dubious.

Ottawa are faring well and are reported to have pretty nearly their whole team signed up and ready to play. They have secured the college oval and expect to begin practices next week. Unless something unforeseen happens, they should be able to open the season in good condition.

Montreal held a very successful meeting on Tuesday, when Albert Friedman, the president of the league, succeeded in enlisting his associates to practically form the Montreal Rangers and the Montreal City teams will represent that city, and they have already more than thirty names affixed to contracts. The Montreal Rangers are expected to begin practices next week. The officials declare they will be good drawing cards.
