PEACE DOVE NOT CLOSE, SAYS HALDANE

Useless to Look for Permanent
Cessation of War for Many
Years, Tho the Relations
Between Britain and Ger-
many Are Constantly
Growing Better — Favors
Woman Suffrage.

NEW YORK, Aug. 29.—(Can. Press).—Viscount Haldane, the first lord high chancellor of Great Britain to leave his country since Cardinal Wolsey went to France four hundred years ago, arrived here today for a five-day visit to this country and Canada. The lord high chancellor, whose position in England corresponds to that of chief justice of the supreme court of the United States, is here as a guest of the American Bar Association before whom he will deliver an address at the annual meeting of the association in Montreal next Monday. Tonight he was entertained at a dinner given in behalf of the association by C. A. Severance of St. Paul. His itinerary includes visits to West Point and Albany.

Previously warned that he might expect to be interviewed by American newspaper men on his arrival in New York, the chancellor smilingly greeted a delegation of them who boarded the Lusitania at quayside and submitted to another interview when he reached the hotel, where he is making his headquarters in this city.

Discussed Many Issues.

Lord Haldane freely discussed many questions of the day, declared that he was in favor of woman suffrage, prophesied that a millennium of peace was far off, said that the relations between Germany and England were never more cordial, praised the intellectual growth of the United States and predicted that Home Rule for Ireland would soon be an accomplished fact. With a merry twinkle in his blue eyes the lord high chancellor joked and quipped with his interviewers between serious remarks and conceded that the American custom of interviewing distinguished visitors was "delightfully progressive."

"It would be a very sanguine person," he said, when asked his opinion (Continued on Page 2, Column 2)

**FIRST REFUGEES
LEAVE MEXICO**

Trainload of Americans Crossed
Mexican Border Under
White Flags, Bound
for Safety.

(Special to The Toronto World.)
EL PASO, Texas, Aug. 29.—With white flags posted in conspicuous places along the coaches, the first trainload of American refugees to reach the border since President Wilson's warning for them to leave Mexico, arrived here today. There were 55 Americans, many prominent Mexican families of Chihuahua, and a carload of 75 Chinese on the special train. Border points west of El Paso report refugees are crossing the border daily, coming out of Mexico overland and making their way here. The majority of the men, women and children in the party today were from Madera, Chihuahua, from the colony of the Pearson Lumber Company, and others were from the mining camps in the same district.

They reported that preparations were being made by Americans in every camp to leave Mexico as soon as they can secure transportation. Those needing assistance will be given aid by American Consul T. D. Edwards, stationed at Juarez. The Chinese were detained at the immigration station, where they will be cared for by the government. The refugees reported the annihilation of a federal command of 1200 by rebels under Villa and Ortega at San Andres, west of Chihuahua, on Aug. 26. All but General Felix Terrazas and thirty of his federals were reported slaughtered, and seven trains seized by the rebels.

CANADA MUST FLATLY REJECT LONG SAULT POWER SCHEME ASSERTS CONSERVATION BOARD

Rights of Ownership and Jurisdiction Must Not Be Impaired by Granting Charter Sought by U. S. Capitalists — Misrepresentation on Part of Corporation Alleged.

OTTAWA, Aug. 29.—(Special).—"The plain duty of Canada is to maintain her rights of ownership and jurisdiction absolutely unimpaired and unimpaired."

In these specific terms the commission of conservation, sets the seal of its disapproval upon the proposal to authorize a private corporation to dam the River St. Lawrence at the Long Sault Rapids for power development purposes. The report of the commission upon the Long Sault power proposition, just issued, is a complete review of a question which has figured largely in the Canadian Parliament and in the legislature of the State of New York, as well as in congress at Washington, owing to the efforts of the Long Sault Development Company, an American enterprise, to obtain a franchise for power development at that point.

It is a question which the commission regards as one of vast importance to the people of Canada, and the report treats of it accordingly.

Canada's Consent Needed.

The Development Company, it is pointed out, owes its origin to an act of the New York State Legislature, passed in 1907, authorizing it to construct dams and other works at Long Sault Island for the development of electrical energy and the "improvement of navigation," but not across the international boundary "unless consented to by the Dominion of Canada."

This charter was asserted subsequently in the interest of the people of the state, and in May last a bill was signed by Governor Sulzer, repealing the charter on the ground of unconstitutionality.

Vigorous Preparations.

Meantime the company has spent a large sum in purchasing property and making other preparations for development, and in the endeavor to keep its charter alive paid into the state, under its terms, \$35,000 in two yearly installments. In January last, the company tendered another payment of \$25,000, which the state refused, and a suit is now pending over the matter. There is also a bill before congress, designed to give the company federal rights over the water on the United States side, where the main channel of the St. Lawrence runs. There are expert of surplus power to the Canadian side; but as the report of the commission points out, the conditions of developments proposed are such as disregard Canadian interests altogether.

Mythical Meetings.

In Canada the Development Company carried on for some years a very active propaganda with a view to creating an impression favorable to the granting of a charter by the Dominion Parliament. It has gone to the length of imposing upon certain newspaper reports of meetings of which no record can be found by the commission. At one of these alleged gatherings the chief engineer of the company is reported to have given assurance that Canada would be entitled to one-half the power developed, while the allurements were held out that the Long Sault would give ample power to every town in the neighborhood. The report points out that the scheme can be carried out, if the company's plans are successful, so as to develop power on a large scale on the south channel, where works would be beyond Canadian control. It is also emphasized that sooner or later a scheme of deepening and improving the St. Lawrence will be devised, and that rights vested in any private corporation at Long Sault might prove an insuperable barrier to the carrying out of the engineering plans.

BLOODY BATTLE WITH GYPSIES

Lunel, Town in France, Scene
of Desperate Encounter—
Gendarmes Killed and
Gypsies Wounded.

MONTEPELLIER, France, Aug. 29.—(Can. Press).—A band of 150 gypsies today attacked the inhabitants of the town of Lunel with guns and revolvers. Gendarmes engaged the gypsies and a pitched battle ensued, in which one gendarme was killed and three were badly wounded.

The fighting of the gypsies was so fierce that they even held out against a company of soldiers for a time. When they fled they left a large number of wounded behind them.

The attack had its origin in a difference of opinion between the gypsies and the townspeople in Lunel.

Tax Payments

FIREBUG GETS BUSY AGAIN

Starts Fire in Stable on Euclid
Avenue and Then Applies
Torch to Harbord Street
Premises.

The incendiary fires that have been keeping the fire brigade and the police on the qui vive for the past five weeks cannot be the work of one man, according to the opinion of officials of both departments, who have been investigating the ravages that have been committed during that period.

Last night a new scene of operations was chosen by the incendiaries and the firemen in the western end of the city were kept busy for some hours.

The stable occupied by Mr. James C. Keenan of 38 Madison avenue on Euclid avenue was the first object of attack, but the firemen managed to get the fire under control with a loss of not more than \$20.

Before the firemen had returned from the scene an alarm was rung in from Harbord street, where a fire, was discovered in the store of James Compton, clothes presser, at No. 160. The cause here was also incendiary and the loss amounted to \$10 to the building and \$20 to the contents. A few minutes later an alarm came in from 173 Brunswick avenue.

The stable in the rear of this house was set fire to by an incendiary and damage amounting to \$90 was done.

POLICE SCANDAL GROWS SERIOUS

Four Thousand Members of
Paris Force Ask That Sus-
pected Blackmailing De-
tectives Be Dismissed.

PARIS, Aug. 29.—The police scandal, due to revelations of blackmailing by plainclothesmen on duty in the Latin quarter, is assuming serious proportions.

On Wednesday 2000 policemen of the uniformed force held a mass meeting to urge the expulsion of suspected detectives from the force.

Prefect Genoux promptly issued a statement in which he practically stigmatized the meeting as organized insubordination, which, he said, he would not tolerate.

In spite of his stern words 1800 other policemen, who had been on duty that night, met in the evening and urged the same measure.

More than four thousand of the police, or half the entire force, belong to the Policemen's Association, which called the meeting.

The judicial authorities are slowly investigating the Latin quarter blackmail cases.

Lord Strathcona at New York

NEW YORK, Aug. 29.—(Can. Press).—Lord Strathcona, Canadian high commissioner, arrived here today from Europe, accompanied by Lady Strathcona. He is on his way to Montreal, where he will attend the annual meeting and banquet of the American Bar Association at the invitation of the association. While Lord and Lady Strathcona were in New York, they were the guests of the American Bar Association, which was held at the Waldorf-Astoria. The high commissioner is expected to return to Montreal on the 31st inst.

While declining to make a prophecy regarding the outcome of the negotiations between the Canadian Government and the American Bar Association, Lord Strathcona said he was opposed to militant methods.

THE HAGUE, Aug. 29.—The ceremony of the unveiling today by Andrew Carnegie of a bust of the late Sir William Randal Cremer in the hall of justice of the new peace palace was the occasion for a great demonstration in favor of the peace movement. Sir William Randal Cremer was the originator of the interparliamentary conferences, a winner of the Nobel peace prize, and for 27 years secretary of the International Arbitration League.

The hall was crowded for the ceremony. Among those in attendance were members of the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace, the International Arbitration League and the Interparliamentary Union. Mr. Carnegie was loudly cheered as he entered the hall and his speech was frequently punctuated with applause.

The Right Hon. Thomas Burt, dean of the British House of Commons, replied to Mr. Carnegie. He said that all things pointed favorably to the realization of Cremer's dream of universal peace, despite the Balkan war.

Lord Weardale, president of the Interparliamentary Union, eulogized Mr. Carnegie, who, he said, had provided Cremer with means which enabled him to accomplish so much in behalf of the peace movement.

WILSON HOPEFUL THAT DANGER IS PASSING

President Leaves Washington
in Belief That Peace in
Mexico is in Near Prospect,
Tho No Definite Action on
Either Side Has Been
Taken.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29.—(Can. Press).—President Wilson left Washington late today for the summer capital at Cornish, N. H., with hope of a favorable conclusion of the negotiations undertaken by this country to bring about peace in Mexico.

Altho no affirmative action on either side had been reported up to the time of the president's departure, encouraging despatches were received from Nelson O'Shaughnessy, in charge of the American embassy at Mexico City, bearing on the general situation.

These reached the president a few hours before his train, and led him to determine upon a short rest over Labor Day.
