

Bowling Organizing New Governing Body

TO PLACE LAWN BOWLING UNDER ONE ASSOCIATION

Preliminary Meeting at London Appoints Delegates and Adjourns Until December.

The basis of the new organisation will be outlined in a draft of rules governing the new association, which will be prepared by the committee. The new association will promote border lines and place the responsibility for the game on the bowler. The new association is now used in curling, dividing up the whole area where the game abounds into districts, each of which will hold a tournament, at which the championship will be decided. The secretary of the new association, Dr. G. O. Knowles, of Toronto was instructed to draft the new rules, and to get the necessary sanction for completion to submit them to representatives of the various associations for their opinion at a big gathering of these bowlers in Toronto, probably in December.
