BIGGEST YIELDS SEEN IN ONTARIO

Farmers Busily Engaged in Golden Harvest, Best for Years.

THRESHING VERY SOON

Great Advance Made by Agriculturists During Fine Weather.

In nearly every harvest field in Onengaged in cutting the golden crop of or gathering it into while others even more advanced were cutting the best crop of barley ever grown in the province. Some there are a few, have not yet garnered all their hay, the yield of which has been away ahead of anything hoped for in the earlier part of the season.

Probably there never was in Ontario a day in which so much advance was made along harvest-and general farm lines as yesterday in the cutting and stooking of wheat, the drawing of it in, the cutting of early fields of bar-ley, the clearing of roots, cultivating the fodder corn already from four to six feet high, and wonderfully luxuriant, gang-plowing the hay stubble, and the hundred-and-one other things common to the farm. While not an ideal day for drying grain, barely enough wind to stir the leaves, it was great ripening weather, and all over the midland counties at least the mag-nificent fields of oats and barley took

on a little different hue. In a week barley cutting all over Ontario will be well advanced, and in ten days the oat harvest will be in full swing. The click of the binder will be followed by the hum of the thresher, and in a fortnight the greatest crop of wheat Ontario has seen in 25 years will be pouring into the hoppers.
