

PLAIN FACTS FOR HOCKEY FOLLOWERS

Last Year's Conditions Satisfactory — Arena Takes Right Stand Again.

Messrs. Kennedy and Calder of the National Hockey League were in town yesterday, and they do not look worried. Kennedy had a hearty laugh when somebody mentioned a new league. Kennedy said that the National Hockey League will hold a meeting within the next ten days, and that the league will operate. This is what The World told the fans two weeks ago. The Toronto Arena still takes the same stand. The N. H. L. hockey last year satisfied the fans and was a big money maker. That is the brand of hockey that Toronto wants, and that is what it will get.

These "fly-by-night" organizations will not move the real managers. The machinery will be set in motion at the right time, and the owners will be looking in. The Arena Gardens is a sound organization, and they will not rent ice to anybody who will not have a real and Ottawa teams in a league. It would be a blunder for one thing, and poor hockey for the fans. The Arena will rent the ice to the right parties, and the fans can rest assured that it will be to their benefit.

In a statement issued by Charles Querrie yesterday, he stated that the Toronto Arena holds a franchise in the N. H. L. until the next annual meeting, and contracts will be sent immediately to all of last year's players with the exception of Holmes, Crawford and Muncey. Holmes is the property of the Seattle club of the Pacific coast league, while Crawford and Muncey belong to Quebec, which club also holds a franchise in the N. H. L. together with Canadiens, Ottawa and Wanderers. The Quebec franchise calls for the right to operate in Quebec only, and cannot be moved to any other city without the permission of the other club owners.

Sound Sensible. In the event of the Toronto Arena not running a team of their own, their contracts with players would be turned back to the league from whom they were secured, and whose property they are, notwithstanding reports to the contrary.

When the National Hockey Association suspended operations in the fall of 1912 they declared all players free agents, and it was not necessary for them to go through a special procedure at the annual meeting held this fall. The players are still bound to the National Hockey League under last year's contracts, until the N. H. L. meets and declares them free agents or offers them new contracts. When the official press agent of the hockey world, Charles Querrie, said that the Toronto Arena would not be organized under the name of the Canadian Hockey Association (said Querrie believed to be a Toronto agent of hockey), looks this over, he will find it is a purely home-brewed, came thru the official channels, and from a source that is open to any sceptic or fan, who is interested.

We have it to the intelligence of any hockey fan, for we believe that the Toronto hockey following is a wise fan, that a league composed of two teams in Ottawa, one in Montreal and a fourth in Hamilton would not be a wise fan, that the Victoria Rink in Montreal, mentioned in certain despatches as a home for the Montreal club, seats more than two hundred fans. Imagine high-class pro hockey being played at this size. Ottawa has found it mighty hard to support one club. Where the attendance would come from to support two clubs more than will go down. Toronto fans are well aware of the situation in Hamilton. A similar analysis of the Toronto situation would show that the Toronto fan is mighty hard to squeeze thru with no salaries to pay. The Hamilton rink is a box-car affair, and five capacity crowds would hardly equal one bumper Toronto Arena crowd.

Can't Be Done. We have heard of "hangers" in sport in the good old days, but the Toronto fans will not believe that anybody is willing to toss away thirty or forty thousand dollars for a few "hangers" in hockey. A few disgruntled persons.

Charles Querrie is the authority for the statement that the Toronto Arena is not anxious to operate a pro team in any league, notwithstanding the most successful season that a Toronto club ever had with their team last year, but are determined to keep the Toronto fan in premier winter sport. The arena is willing to fight, and the fans are sure, with last year's record behind the arena, that the man who pays his money for the game will be amply protected with an organization that is a winner and a money-maker, the only kind of sport that is successful.

BACK TO OLD COURSE FOR DUNLOP GRIND

In view of the fact that this is the 25th year in which the Dunlop Trophy race has been contested, without interruption, it has been decided for the contest on Oct. 19 to go back to the course where the first race was held in 1884, namely, the old course, and the only difference will be that instead of starting on Main street and going over a route of five miles twice, this giving the spectators a chance to see the race at three different periods, namely, the start, the turn at the original starting point, and the finish. Leaving the course out in this way will also avoid the railroad crossings.

Many of the riders who took part in the first race will be on hand as officials, such as Robert Falconer, Alf. Marshall, E. Shortt, Jack Smith, Herb Marshall, etc. President of the race, C. W. A. will come down from Montreal to act as honorary referee of the race. There will be 25 individual prizes—three time prizes, prize for the first boy over 15 to finish, and the team prize. In addition to the famous trophy itself, which goes to the first rider, and the team prize of five medals which go to the winning team. Last year's individual winner was H. Stroud of the Salems, and this time also captured the team shield, Norman Webster, now in Staveland, captured the team prize last year.
