

SIR BARTON BEATEN IN DWYER STAKES

Hildreth Colt Comes From Behind in Stretch to Win.

Aqueduct, July 10.—With Eternal Questionnaire and Cirrus scratched, the field was narrowed to three starters—Sir Barton, carrying 127 pounds; Purchase, with 115, and Crystal Ford with 109, in the Dwyer Stakes here today.

Sir Barton went to the lead at the start, closely followed by Crystal Ford and Purchase, a half a length apart. These positions were held to the head of the stretch, where Purchase came from behind, passed Crystal Ford and won Sir Barton by a length.

Crystal Ford was 12 lengths in the rear.

Rain Interferes With Grand Circuit Program at North Randall.

Cleveland, July 10.—Only three of the scheduled six Grand Circuit races were decided at North Randall today because of a heavy rainstorm which delayed the start of the first race nearly four hours. As a result, it was announced that the meeting would continue into Saturday.

Despite the unfavorable weather, another record crowd was on hand.

Mariondale, third choice in the betting, won the Tavern "Steak" of \$3000 for 214 trotters, the feature of the program.

After deciding the third mile of this event a dead heat between Mariondale and Lockspur, the judge's reversed their ruling and gave the classic to Mariondale because he stood first in the summary.

The auction pool with \$3200 was the largest ever made on the local track.

The judges called off a pool betting on the 215 trot. It was announced this action was taken because of the alleged listless driving of Dodge behind Holyrood Naomh in the first two heats.

Saginaw, Mich., July 10.—Driver Harry Gray enjoyed a big day at Saginaw's short-stroke meeting today, when he put Sunburn Pointer over a winner in the 214 pacing stage for \$1000. It was the fifth straight time Gray has headed the summary in this event in the five weeks.

Gray had nothing to it but Sunburn Pointer in straight heats, David B. winning second money by finishing second in the final heat after a nice drive.

Gray had a second choice, Silcock in the 215 trot, but he trimmed the favorite, Lady Bird, handily in straight heats. The judges unseated Rowby and put Vic Fleming up behind Lady Bird in the third heat, after Rowby had twice finished second, but it made no difference.

Abu Taleb, also driven by Gray, was a strong favorite in the 215 trotting stake, but found Davis Watts and Josie B. too much for him. After David took the first two heats, Abu Taleb raced her hard to the three-quarter pole in the third, and Josie B. came on and won.

Davis Watts laid up in the fourth heat, which Josie B. also annexed.

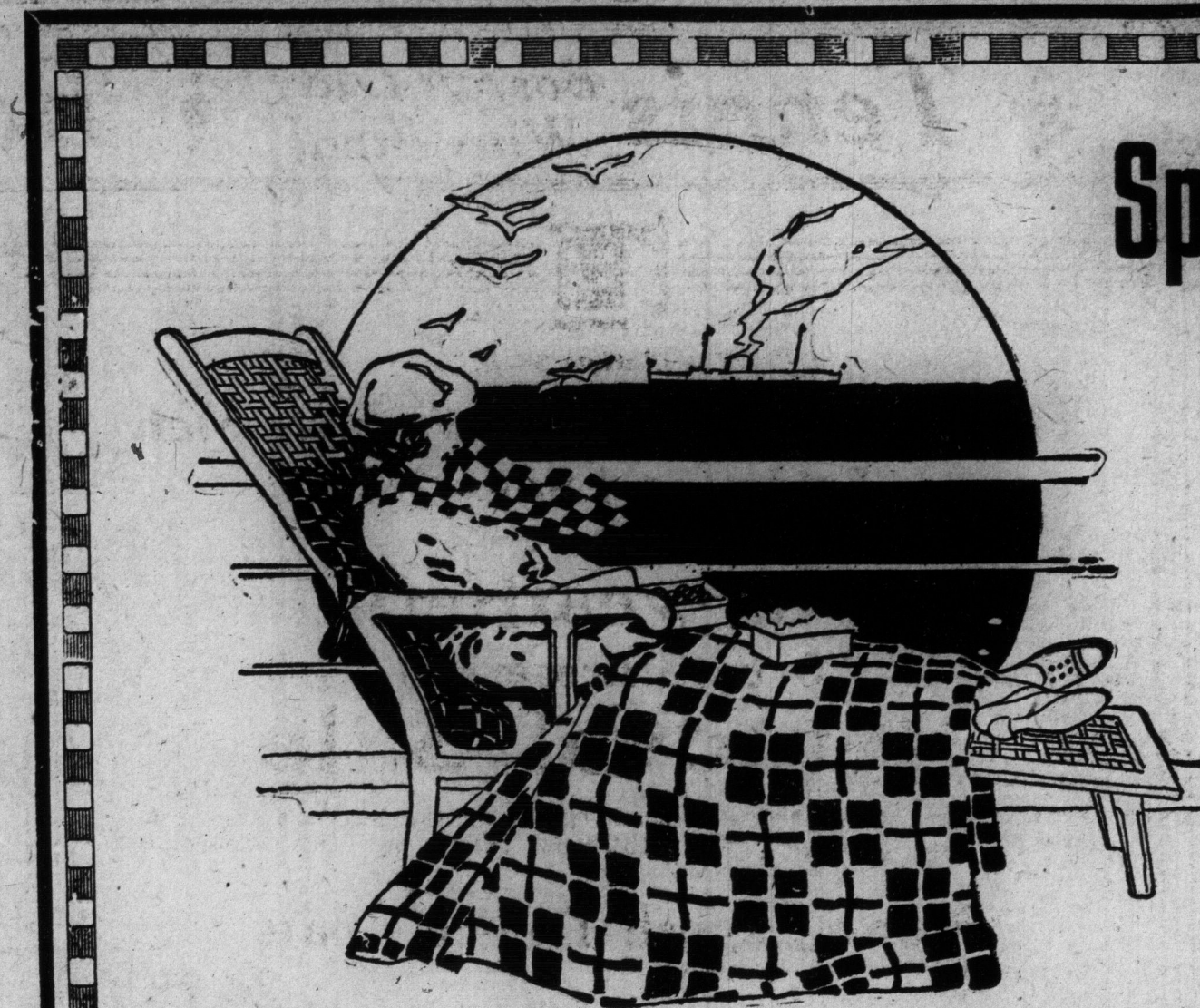

ALL RELATIONS WITH MAJORS BROKEN OFF

Big Leagues Will Not Be Allowed to Draft Any Players.

Chicago, July 10.—All relations between the major and minor baseball leagues were definitely broken off at a meeting today of a committee representing the National Association of Minor Leagues.

The committee adopted resolutions ratifying the action taken at the joint meeting with the major leagues in New York last January, when the national agreement was abrogated.

The minor leagues will operate independently of the major leagues, and will attempt to settle all disputes within their own organization, instead of appealing to the National Commission for final decision on any case.

The action of the minor league committee means that the major leagues will not be permitted to draft players this fall. Contracts and territorial rights, however, will be respected.

AMATEUR BASEBALL

In the West Toronto League, Green clean-up hitter, the Bellwoods, Jordan amateur champions, 1918, is setting the pace for the hitters, with a grand average of .358.

Short and Rush of the Giants are leading the base-stealers, each of these players having pilfered seven times.

The Giants, who were defeated in the finals for the junior amateur championship, look just about as good as to win this honor this year. They have rounded

out the best team of their four years' career.

Hamilton, who has pitched the last two games for the Giants, has struck out 27 of the 54 batters to face him, has only allowed nine hits, and two not-earned runs to be scored against him, these being the result of errors.
