NO GRAFTERS IN THIS PARTY  
TRAITORS OUT WHEN ASKED

## Chicago Gives Birth to New Political Organization With Commendable Objects.

Chicago, April 9.—With the declaration that widespread graft in civic life, and the domination of political bosses have produced a condition more dangerous to the republic than that which led to the Civil War, representatives of sixty-three labor and reform bodies met yesterday in convention and launched a new political party. A permanent organization has been formed and officers have been elected.

The new party is to be known as the Chicago Progressive Alliance, and it plans to capture the primaries and nominate men to office who will be free from the influence of any of the old political party machines.

The recall of men elected to public office when they betray the interests of their constituents is made a prominent feature of the platform of the new party. Each candidate, before accepting nomination, must sign a pledge that he will honestly and fearlessly make the contest against men no alliance with any other political party or person, if elected he will be required to place his resignation in the hands of the party, to take effect when a petition signed by a majority of the voters in his ward or district is filed with the county clerk.

Local option in the matter of taxation is favored in the platform, and also legislation requiring a trial by jury where contempt of court is charged in labor injunction cases involving acts performed out of the presence of the court.

MEANS MONEY FOR ONTARIO  
DOMINION MUST PAY 5 P.C.

But Decision That Full Amount May Be Paid Off Will Be Appealed.

The announcement by the provincial treasurer of the result of litigation between the province and the Dominion governments respecting the rate of interest on certain trust funds held by the latter, and discussion on Major Clark's bill to reduce the number of judgeships, were interesting features of yesterday's short session of the legislature.

Col. Matheson's announcement that he had just received advice from Aemilius Irving, K.C., who was of the Ontario government's legal counsel, of a decision by Judge Burridge of the court of exchequer, conveyed the meaning that the province had won a partial victory over the Dominion government in litigation over the trust funds.

Since confederation these funds had been held up till two years ago at a five per cent. interest rate. The funds are made up of a common school fund of \$1,469,000 and a land improvement fund of \$1,200,000. Two years ago the Dominion government claimed the right to pay off the whole amount, and on this being refused, reduced the interest on other than the common school fund to four per cent, entailing a loss to the province of \$15,000 yearly.

The decision, which fixes five per cent. as the uniform rate and compelling the Dominion government to make up the lapse also gives the Dominion the right to pay off the whole at any time. Col. Matheson stated this ruling would be appealed thru the supreme court, and if necessary, thru the privy council. He figures that, as a perpetual asset at five per cent, it would be worth \$400,000, or \$500,000 more to the province than it otherwise invested.

## Too Many Judges.

Should the bill by Major Clark, which received its second reading yesterday, become law, it will result in a considerable reduction in the number of judicial appointments for the province. The bill provides that in any county of less population than 80,000 only one judge should hold office. Major Clark pointed out that up till 1896 the unit was 40,000. In that year the Liberal government of Ontario was considering asking the Dominion government to make the unit 30,000, when a change in government at Ottawa prompted a change in the request, whereby the Dominion government appointed two judges to a county of 30,000. This, Mr. Clark declared, made it possible for an extra judge to be appointed thru a lie in the issuing of a commission.

Hon. Mr. Roy agreed with the speaker's view that in many counties there were now two judges where one could easily do the work.

Hon. Mr. Ross thought the legal machinery of the province had improved in the high court, where there are now four divisions, the work was done more expeditiously than ever before. However, there might be too many judges.

"There are a large number of counties where two judges aren't necessary," ruled Premier Whitney. "The question should form part of anything in the nature of law reform which may be taken up."

Mr. Whitney's opinion was that the proposed measure could do no harm, while a good deal of good might come from it. He referred it to a select legal committee.

**Telephone Regulation.**

Mr. Lucas, in withdrawing his bill to allow any telephone line to be connected with any other line, said he did so because of legislation recently introduced at Ottawa, which made it unnecessary. He made the suggestion, however, that the new railway board be given authority to regulate the telephone lines operating in Ontario. He hoped the importance of having uniform standards for all the small rural lines would be seen.

A second reading was given Mr. Lucas's bill with the clauses relating to revenue eliminated.

**Bills Passed.**

The order paper was decorated with no less than 48 bills, which were presented for their final readings, giving a rather striking evidence of the heavy routine work of the present session. The following bills were passed thru the final stages:

Mr. Cochrane—Respecting the department of lands, forests and mines.

Mr. Cochrane—To amend the act to preserve the forests from destruction by fire.

Mr. Preston (Durham)—Respecting the United Counties of Northumberland and Durham.

Mr. Calder—Respecting the Town of Oshawa.

Mr. Lennox—To authorize the Law Society of Upper Canada to admit Henry Ernest Redman to practice as a barrister.

Mr. McCowan—To authorize the Law Society of Upper Canada to permit George Macgregor Gardner to practice as a barrister.

Mr. Crawford—Respecting the Anglo-American Fire Insurance Company.

Mr. Preston (Durham)—Respecting the Village of Campbellford.

Mr. Lucas—Respecting the Town of Thornbury and the Township of Collingwood.

As the house was rising Mr. Whitney announced that the education bills would be introduced to-morrow.

## ILL, LEFT ALONE TO DIE IS FOUND NEARLY STARVED

Italian Laborers at Niagara Falls Desert Comrade—Curious Boy Discovers Him.

Niagara Falls, Ont., April 9.—Michele Carowitz, a Hungarian, nearly dead of starvation within a few feet of one of the busiest thoroughfares around Niagara Falls. He was one of a party of Hungarian laborers living in a little house on Portage-road, just outside of the city limits at Falls View. Carowitz developed consumption and was too ill to work. His companions cared for him, but when the completion of the power development threw them out of work and they left town they left him to his fate.

Ernest Baxter, who drives his father's meat delivery wagon and has been supplying the house with meat, was impelled by curiosity to go thru the empty building. In a little pantry-like room he was amazed to find a man so feeble that it seemed hardly possible there could be life in him lying on the floor, covered with a piece of blanket, and without a scrap of food in sight.

Two weak to get out of the room, Carowitz had been unable to do anything to help himself after his abandonment, and had lain there listening to the trolley cars, wagons and pedestrians passing close by, helplessly waiting for starvation, cold or disease to end his sufferings. There was not a bit of fire or a scrap of food anywhere in the house.

The police and the Stamford Township authorities are taking action to feed the long child and lack of food have given Carowitz such a shock that he will probably die.

The new public lavatory at Spadina-avenue and Queen-street was opened yesterday morning. In addition to the conveniences, there are two wash basins, where for three cents citizens may get the use of a towel and a good wash. The cost of the structure was \$4500.
