LAND REGISTRATIONS.

Report Shows That 2026 Settlers Came From United States. Ottawa, Feb. 21.—The report of the Interior Department for the last fiscal year, laid before parliament by Mr. Sifton yesterday, shows a total revenue from lands registration fees of \$1,000,000, a net increase of \$26,208 over the previous year. Since 1894 the department has had a surplus of \$3,913,420 of revenue over expenditure.

Montreal, Feb. 21.—The frauds in the St. James' election were yesterday ventilated yesterday, when ten more electors went into the box and swore that they had voted for Mr. Bergerson at poll No. 37, making it up to date, with more to hear from yet. At the close of the poll there were only four Bergerson ballots in the box. One gentleman testified that he had not voted at 37, but at No. 21, yet his name had been entered twice on the official sheet as having voted at the poll in question. Two of the chief witnesses in the case have been spirited away, and Mr. Bergerson gave orders to-day to have a bench warrant issued against them. It is rumored that Mr. Brunet will resign.

CIGARS BY THE MILLION

An Account of a Visit to the Yonge-street Warehouse of W. B. Reid & Company.

AN EXTENSIVE ESTABLISHMENT

Some Details Concerning a Firm Which Has Made Rapid Progress in Five Years.

On the west side of Yonge-street, a few doors below Melinda-street, is situated one of Canada's biggest tobacco emporiums—that of Messrs. W. B. Reid & Co. Some days ago the writer of this article, who is at once a member of the World staff and "a lover of the weed," paid a visit to this well-known establishment, which, in its every feature, displays the outward and visible signs of success for which it is widely celebrated.

A conservative looking plate glass front, supplemented by Luxfer prism upper sashes, meets the visitor's eye as he approaches this warehouse, and, upon entering, he finds himself in a wide hall, flanked on either side by private and general offices, done in quarter-cut oak woodwork, brass grillwork and clipped glass. Beyond this hall-way stands a half square of glass showcases, in which are displayed some of the firm's finer classes of goods, and beyond these cases again opens out a large hall, in which are piled almost to the ceiling with the same goods.

So far I have described only the ground floor of the premises, and the second floor has not been touched upon at all as yet. From the former to the latter the visitor ascends by elevator or by an ornamental structure known as "the golden stairs."

On the second floor, which boasts the same extensive proportions as does the lower, is found a great array of fine gold-mounted pipes, in cases and without, an assortment of tobacco jars and smokers' utensils in general. Along with these is carried an extensive collection of gold and silver-mounted cases.

A Successful Business. These details give with an idea of conveying to the reader a conception of the proportions of the establishment and of its devices, covered by the firm. The staff of the warehouse, including typewriters and salesmen, totals nineteen persons.

The proprietor of this enterprise, Mr. W. B. Reid, is a vigorous, wide-awake young Scotchman, born 39 years ago at Rothies, in the Highlands, he came to this country some fourteen winters ago, since which time he has been almost continually in the tobacco business.

Only five or six years have elapsed since he started out for himself in the manufacturing, importing and wholesale line, and he has been remarkably successful.

DAMANT'S HORSE DISASTER

An Ottawa Trooper Gives an Account of the Reverse at Tabe's Kop.

Boers in Khaki Crept Up and Drove Them From the Ridge. Ottawa, Feb. 21.—Alwynne Kent of Ottawa, who is a trooper in Damant's Horse, in a letter to his mother gives a stirring account of the disaster which overtook the force at Tabe's Kop, Orange River Colony, in December.

Writing on Dec. 27 he states: "No doubt, you have heard about our disaster. It was an awful sight. They shot our men down in cold blood. On Dec. 18 we got orders to pack up, but we did not trek until the next day.

On Dec. 19 we got to Tabe's Kop. Just after breakfast we camped there until 7, and we were off on our long night march. It was raining, lightning and thundering. It was something awful. While all this was going on the Boers in khaki were creeping up the hill and Col. Damant thought they were our men until too late, and they shot our men down like dogs. Oh, it was an awful sight. I do not want to see the like again. Our losses, counting the sharpshooters, were 39 killed and 42 wounded. Major Drummond was hit seven times. Capt. Webb was hit twice. Capt. Scott gathered all available men that were not hit, and we rushed the ridge and struck all the guns. The Boers got all the guns, but our men had disabled them just before the Boers got them. It was a terrible day. I am sorry to say that one of our men, whose name was Duffy, that came on the same boat with us, was killed. The Boers told him to hold up his hands and he did so. They shot him in the back and he died. It was an awful sight to see the dead and dying all over the hill. I know you would get word of it, so thought I would write and let you know all about it. The bullets fell around us like hailstones.

Last Sunday at the various barracks over 400 persons knelt at the Army pentecost service.
