The Net Result of the Court of Revision's Labor.

Board of Works Waiting for Mr. Chipman-Wolfe Street May be Macadamized-City Hall Notes.

The exact result of the Court of Revision's work has been figured up. Their total reduction of the original assessment was \$37,525, and not \$25,-000, as roughly estimated a few days ago. The largest individual reductions were those of the Consolidated Plate Glass Company and the Western Wire and Nail Works-\$5,000 each. The income assessment of the fire insurance companies which was struck off, amounted to nearly \$10,000. The reduction of \$37,525 does not include titled to further exemption under the bylaw, such as the Grand Trunk, and others whose assessments have been fixed.

WAITING FOR MR. CHIPMAN. Engineer Chipman, of Toronto, was expected in the city today to confer with the Board of Works tonight on the sewerage question, but at noon he had not turned up. The plans and specifications are complete, awaiting his inspection and approval. If they are satisfactory the board has instructions from the City Council to call for tenders for the work. This looks as if the council had already decided in favor of the contract system, but the decision can be changed, if day labor is found to be preferable. There can be no harm in calling for tenders, as the cost of the work by contract will then be ascertained, and may be compared with the cost by labor. Mr. Chipman has sent no word when he will come, but a special meeting of the board can be called at any time.

MACADAMIZING WOLFE STREET. Dr. Roome, ex-M.P., is so much Dufferin avenue that he has asked for an estimate of the cost of macadamizing Wolfe street. It is a narrow thoroughfare, and the cost will not be so great as on Dufferin avenue. Fortunately It Was Only a Horse-Broken Guy Wire the Cause.

The trolley wire claimed its first victim last night.

About 10:30 o'clock George Maker and Ed. Stenberg were driving past the corner of Wellington and Horton streets, when suddenly their horse staggered and fell. Mr. Maker hurriedly ran to find the cause, and received a shock that sent him reeling

A trolley guy wire had become un-fastened and was trailing to the ground. It had become crossed with a "live" wire and made a perfect communicator of the fluid above to earth beneath. Water is a great electrical conductor, and as the night was wet, the current was particularly strong The horse's head came in contact with it, and death was probably instantaneous, as the brain would be immediately affected. At any rate, the animal showed no sign of life after it fell. It was owned by Mr. Maker, who prized it as a valuable driver.

Political Map of the United States Reconstructed.

The Old Dividing Line Obliterated by Tuesday's Results.

Chicago, Nov. 5 .- Take a map of the United States, and with a pencil draw a line, starting at the mouth of the Potomac River, on Chesapeake Bay, and, following the Potomac to the boundary line between the two Virginias. Follow this line to the Tennessee border, and draw west, leaving eTnnessee below the line, and Kentucky above; then follow up the Mississippi River to the lower edge of Iowa, and turn the corner of Iowa and trace a long the south line of Lower Dakota, and thence north to the Canadian boundary. You will thus have described the new line of demarcation between the gold standard forces of the east and the silver elements of the wset and south. Every State north and east of the line described is for McKinley. Every State west and south of it went for Bryan, with the exception of California and Oregon on the Pacific. The States in which the result of the election is closest lie along this rontier line-Delaware, the Virginias, Kentucky, Missouri, South Dakota, and Wyoming, thus showing where the battle waged the fiercest.

This line is doubly interesting because it does not follow the course of the historical Mason and Dixon's line, and for the first time in the last thirty odd years, the phrase "Solid South" has no political significance. The late arriving returns, dispatches from points remote which have been received during the past 24 hours, give conviction to the approximated tables of the day before. Nebraska, Washington and Kansas may now be added to the Bryan table and Oregon to the

Mr. Isaac Flock Dies at Pittsburg, Pennsylvania
