SHOT TO DEATH

Man Kills Wife and Male Companion on Streets of City.

Portsmouth, Ohio, Aug. 27.—John Harr and Mrs. Flora Hughes were shot to death last night, and the woman's husband, Jarro Hughes, is in jail, charged with the crime. He denies knowing anything about the shooting. The streets were filled with people on their way to church. Harr and Mrs. Hughes were walking together down Third street. Just as they got under a street lamp at Jefferson street, a man rushed out from a foundry yard, walked between them and fired five revolver shots. Harr dropped dead, and Mrs. Hughes died at the city hospital. Hughes and his wife have been separated for some time.

With nearly every military organization in the cities of Canada, scarcely a year passes that a pleasure trip is not taken somewhere. Of late years the taste of the urban militiaman for travel has developed to such a fastidious extent that an exchange of visits with another Canadian regiment does not suffice. New York, Buffalo, and other cities across the border are being made more famous year after year, because they have the honor of a visit from one or more Canadian regiments.

Many considered it the most wonderful. The conditions were against the little mare. She is small and light, and like a hard, smooth track. At its best the Galesburg track is as fast as any other, but it was not at its best today. Yesterday's heavy rain had left it with a tendency to "cup," and she did not get the firm foothold that she likes best. There was also a soft spot next the rail at the turn for home, which necessitated her keeping out wide and going a long mile. To add to these handicaps, a stiff breeze blew directly in her face for half the journey.

Before mounting the sulky Dean said that he did not expect her to beat 2:02. The quarter time was 2:25, 1:40, 1:30%, 2:00%. She finished going faster than at any other spot in the mile. The rating was truly remarkable, considering that Dean did it entirely without assistance. The mile exceeds any other by a harness horse under such conditions. While the two Chicago teams continue their triumphal marches and the teams behind them see the chariot fight appearing in clouds of dust, the beaten aspirants for pennant honors are pushing forth excuses. With the Giants it is Mathewson's inefficiency early in the season, the absence of Mike Donlin and the late suspension of John McGraw for badting Umpire Johnston. With the Pirates, it is their batting slump, and the failure of Brooklyn to win more games from the Cubs. The other National League teams are so far behind that excuses would be useless.

In the American League ranks the weakness of the pitching staff is the Highlanders' excuse; with the Athletics it is the absence of Lave Cross and Connie Mack's inability to develop a successor for the veteran at third base. The excuse of the Cleveland Naps, the injuries to Bradley, Bay, Bemis, Buelow and Rossman early in the season.

Manager Frank Chance, who brought the Cubs to the front, is considered one of the greatest ballplayers in the business. As a first baseman he has long been considered a star. As a batter he is among the first half-dozen in the league. He is one of the best baserunners in the business.

Chance's ability as a manager was discovered by accident. When Frank Selee was compelled by illness last season to give up his post as manager of the Cubs, Chance was placed in charge of the team as acting manager. The team did so well that Chance was signed to manage the club this year. His shrewdness in the game was carried through by President Murphy at the suggestion of Chance made his team pennant winners. He secured Sheekard, Steinfeldt, Jack Taylor and Over-all. They were the men he wanted and he paid heavily to get them.

In Chicago they think Chance is the greatest manager that ever lived. On the National League circuit, outside of Chicago, the young Californian has many staunch admirers.

The great work of the Windy City teams has developed Mordecai Brown, the Cubes, and Ed Walsh, of the Sox, as the premier slammers of the year. They have pushed aside veterans like Mathewson, Phillippe, Young, Waddell, and Chesbro. Both are youngsters and less than a year ago were threatened with the "tin can."

Up to date Brown has bagged 22 out of 27 games pitched this season. He has won his last six straight, including two victories over the Giants, and in 13 innings has allowed his opponents only three runs.

Walsh has done even better since he struck his gut. He won ten straight games, and only two runs were made off him in 64 innings.

The feat that pleases the young pitcher as much as anything he has done is the striking out of Willie Keeler twice this season. Few twirlers who have worked during the last fifteen years in the National and American League can boast of this achievement.

The pitching staffs of both teams have stood the strain well. Lundgren, Taylor, Pfeister and Reulbach have been winners for the Cubs all along. Now Biggie Over-all has joined the victors' bunch.

For the Sox, Owen, White, Patterson and Altrock have done splendid work. Manager-Feider Jones has been due to his making the spit ball. Jones says Frank Smith also has the "spitter" under control, and he will be used in the box when the Sox make their final stand on the home grounds.

Only once before in the history of the game has it been possible to play a world's championship series between two teams in the same city. That was fifteen years ago in Boston in the last year of the existence of the old American Association, when both the National League and the Association teams landed the pennants in their respective organizations. The Association made overtures for the post-season series, but the National club owners refused to recognize the representatives of the "outlaws."
