FISH DINNERS FOR LONDONERS JUST TRIPLED

300 Per Cent Increase in Consumption Recorded During Past Year.

MEAT SALES FALL OFF

Butchers and Dealers Report Tremendous Jump in Use of Finny Substitute.

That housewives of the city are co-operating to reduce the cost of living by practicing economy is emphatically shown by the fact that the consumption of fish during the last year in London has increased 300 per cent.

Figures in the possession of local fish dealers show that their sales were never so large as they are at the present time. Another evidence that the citizens are eating five times the amount of fish now as they did one year ago is the marked decrease in the sales of local butchers.

"Since the newspapers boasted the 'eat more fish' idea there has been a pronounced falling off in our sales of meat," John Anderson of Anderson's vertises. "We are selling fish at a fast clip, but the sale of meat has decreased."

Notwithstanding the increased demand for fish there has been no noticeable advance in prices. In fact herring has declined 2c since the inauguration of the "eat more fish" campaign. Whitefish sells at 15c a pound, cod brings 12c, halibut calls for 25c, and salmon, trout sells at 15c. These prices are practically similar to those prevalent one year ago. It has been pointed out by fish men that the greater the demand for fish the greater will be the efforts of the fisherman, because the efforts of the fisherman can easily be doubled by securing more help and augmenting fishing facilities.

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At the meeting of the board of health yesterday afternoon Dr. H. W. Hill, M. O. H., again sounded a note of warning regarding the prevalence and the precautions that should be taken with respect to the large number of cases of diphtheria, sore throat and diptheria now in the city.

The monthly report submitted showed 26 cases of diphtheria, 21 of septic sore throat and 31 of measles. At the first indication of sore throat Dr. Hill advises that the affected person be immediately seen by a physician. It is to be suspiciously like diptheria, anti-toxin should be administered in order to make a positive diagnosis. If diphtheria is present the chances for recovery under the anti-toxin treatment if administered early are much greater than if it is not given. Seven deaths resulted during the month from diphtheria, so it is really seen how important it is to give the matter early attention.

The following is a list and number of the cases reported to the board of health during the month: Crickheep, diphtheria, 26; septic sore throat, 21; measles, 31; German measles, 6; mumps, 1; scarlet fever, 1; smallpox, 0; tuberculosis, 0; typhoid, 1; whooping cough, 12; anterior-meningitis, 2; scarlet spinal meningitis, 0; total, 112.

Two of the cases reported as anterior-meningitis were not seen until after the period of infectiveness was over, it is doubtful if they really were genuine cases.

One of the cases reported as diphtheria were positive cultures from the throats of well people. They were quarantined as carriers and the usual precautions taken.

One death recorded in the hospital report as diphtheria died of pneumonia a few hours after admittance into the hospital. No culture was taken.

\$4.00 PER MINUTE IS POLICE COURT RATE STRUCK THIS MORNING

Session Lasts Five Minutes and Nets City \$20.

Four dollars a minute was the police court rate struck this morning by Magistrate Gray. The case lasted five minutes and \$20 was slipped over to Police Court Clerk Moule by the two drunks in the case.

One was found drunk on a public road yesterday. He declared that he was a lane he was in, and how could a lane be a public street? However, he would waive the point and admit that he was drunk. Far be it from him to argue with the magistrate, who passed over a \$10 fine.

EXTENSION LECTURES SERIES OF 'U' WILL BEGIN ON NOV. 20

Canadian Confederation Will Be Subject of These Special Addresses.

A series of extension lectures under the auspices of the Western University and dealing with Canadian Confederation, is announced to be given in the Public Library Building on three successive Tuesday evenings, beginning with the lecture on "The Union," by Dr. L. A. Wood, professor of history at the Western, will speak on "The Future of the Confederation," and on the third Tuesday, December 4, Dr. E. E. Heathcote, president of the university, will speak on "The Promise of Canada's Future."

These lectures will be open free to the public and will be of timely interest in view of the completion of 50 years of confederation and the way in which the union of 1867 has proven strong during all the stress of the last three years.

It is likely that after the first of the year a second series of lectures on various subjects of timely interest will be given by members of the university faculty and others who are specialists in their own fields.
