Ottawa, Jan. 7 .- No authoritative announcement is yet available as to any plan which may be considered to pool the food resources of the Dominion and the United States for the benefit of the Allies. The suggestion has been made in Washington dispatches that action along this gestion has been made in Washington dispatches that action along this line should be taken, and the matter is one that will engage the attention of the war committee of the cabinet, of which Hon, N. W. Rowell is the president, at an early date. No concrete proposal, or proposals, has yet been formulated at Washington or the Dominion capital, but the increasing necessities of the Allies as indicated in recent advices received by the food controler from Europe, make apparent the desirability for joint action by the two governments having under their control the biggest supplies of food within a reasonable distance of Great Britain, France and Italy.
