

STATISTICS REVEAL THAT MOSTLY YOUNG PEOPLE DIE OF "FLU"

Seventy-Five Per Cent Are
Under 30 Years.

GREAT CALL FOR VACCINE

Licensed Vendors Report a
Diminishing Demand for
Liquor.

TORONTO, Oct. 22.—Further evidence that it is younger people who are largely falling victims to the influenza epidemic is furnished in the reports received by the vital statistics branch of the provincial board of health.

For the first 22 days of this month 600 death certificates have been received by the department from undertakers outside of cities, the people having died with either influenza or pneumonia. Ordinarily the number of deaths from communicable diseases average between 150 and 200 a month.

Of these 600 deaths, 65 per cent were of persons between 20 and 30 years old, another 10 per cent were of persons between 15 and 20, and the remainder over the 30-year mark.

Great Call for Vaccine.

Twenty-six hundred more doses of the preventive were applied for by various municipalities today, and it is being sent out as fast as it can be manufactured. Twenty-two thousand doses were placed at the disposal of the military authorities today. By the end of this week the provincial board of health will have large quantities of the vaccine on hand for the treatment of the general public.

TORONTO, Oct. 22.—A private view of the 1918 Victory Loan films to be used for publicity purposes in the drive which commences on Monday, October 23, was given here today, and it is expected that the ban on movie houses will have been lifted by the various municipal health authorities in time for their use.

The group of stars who have donated their services to the cause includes Mary Pickford, who is a Canadian by birth; Douglas Fairbanks, Charles Chaplin, William S. Hart, Lillian Gish, William Farnum and Geraldine Farrar.

The motion picture interests, headed by Jules and Jay J. Allen, volunteered their services to the Government, with the result that in addition to the strong printed arguments for the Victory Loan that have been circulated through the country, these pictures will be shown from place to place throughout the campaign to further its success.

AMHERSTBURG IN LINE.

MONTENEGRINS AND SERBS DEFEAT HUN FORCES IN BALKANS

Over 1,600 Prisoners Captured,
Besides Considerable Booty.

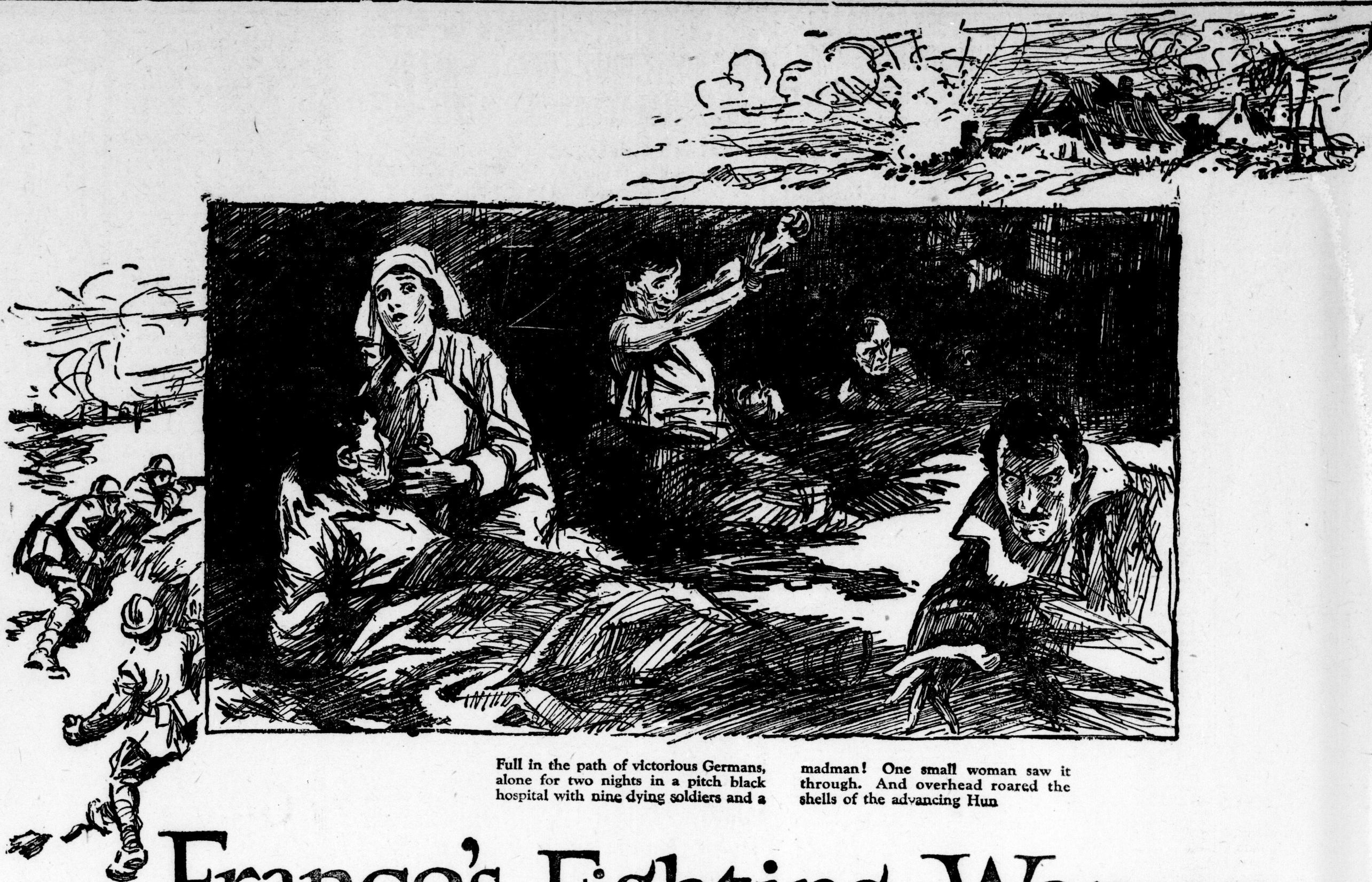
PARIS, Oct. 22.—The official communication dealing with operations in the eastern theatre, says:
"On October 21 French forces reached on the Danube, Lom-Palanka (Bulgaria), 22 miles southeast of Vidin, which they occupied. They captured a convoy of enemy barges loaded with merchandise and wheat."
"North of Aleksinatz Serbian forces have progressed, notwithstanding very strong resistance by the enemy. Serbian cavalry have reached the region east of Paraclin, capturing part of the headquarters staff of a German division, including the archives and baggage of Gen. von Gallwitz, commander of the German division."
"In the region of Novi Pazar and Ipek a detachment of Serbian and Montenegrin troops, supported by French troops captured, in the course of engagements with the retreating Austro-Germans, more than 1,600 prisoners and much booty."

BORDEN WILL SUMMON PREMIERS' CONFERENCE BEFORE NOVEMBER 15

VICTORIA, B. C., Oct. 22.—Sir Robert Borden has wired Premier Oliver that it is his intention to call a conference of provincial premiers before November 15 next. On September 17 last Sir Oliver wired Sir Robert asking him to arrange for such a meeting for the purpose of affording the head of each province in the Dominion an opportunity to discuss the problem presented by the demobilization of the Canadian army. Mr. Oliver pointed out the necessity for the action to be taken immediately so that a broad Canadian policy might be formulated with provincial machinery working harmoniously with that of the Dominion.
It is understood that the conference held in Regina on Tuesday last was adjourned after one day's session on the understanding that Sir Robert would call the national conference.

ANYONE WHO LOAF LIABLE TO ARREST WITHOUT CEREMONY

OTTAWA, Oct. 22.—The anti-loafing law has been amended in such a manner as to provide for arrest without a warrant.
"Any peace officer," the amendment reads, "may arrest without warrant any person whom he believes on reasonable and probable grounds to be violating the provisions hereof, i.e. the anti-loafing law and such peace officer is justified in making such arrest."
