ASKING \$5,000 FOR ALLEGATIONS MADE AGAINST CHARACTER

Richard Rycraft Claims He Has Been Held Up To Ridicule.

Alleging that he has been accused of stealing and has been held up to the ridicule, execration and contempt of his fellow-citizens, Richard T. Rycraft of Biddulph, has entered suit against W. J. McPhillips in the county court for \$5,000.

The plaintiff, who is a farmer, claims that on December 31, 1918, in Coursey's Hotel at Luanan, the defendant, falsely and maliciously spoke and published of him, and that he has been held up to the ridicule of his fellow-citizens.

The defendant denies the allegations, but stated that if he did make the statements which the plaintiff claimed that he had, that he made them on privileged occasions and without malice. This case, which was tried in the county court, was postponed from the winter session because of the illness of one of the witnesses.

J. M. McVey is acting for the plaintiff, and Meredith & Meredith for the defendant.

All together four non-jury cases and five jury cases have been entered for trial next week.
