GREECE RESIGNS VENIZELOS PREMIER CABINET

MAN REPORTED MISSING FROM HOME SINCE

Whereabouts of Samuel Christie Are Unknown.

Anti-Bolshevik Leader Audes Capture by Reds.

London, Nov. 16.—Gen. Baron Wrangel, head of the South Russian Government, whose army has been virtually wiped out by the Bolshevik offensive in Crimea, left Sebastopol on a Russian cruiser filled with soldiers, says a Constantinople dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company. The cruiser was accompanied by three transports carrying 20,000 troops and another carrying ing 20,000 troops and another carrying nded men, the fleet sailing for an unknown port.

FRANCE NOT READY YET TO RECOGNIZE SOVIET GOVERNMENT

Paris, Nv. 16.—The defeat of Gen. Wranget, whose South Russian Government had been recognized by France, does not mean that France is ready to consider recognition of the Russian soviet government, it was said at the foreign office today. The French Government is pessimistic regarding any further military movements in Russia at present, it was indicated.

INDUSTRIAL SLUMP **SLOWLY SPREADING** THROUGHOUT STATES

Factories in All Sections of the Country Curtailing Production.

SOME CLOSING DOWN

Pennsylvania Railroad Alone Has Laid Off 10,000 Men in Few Weeks.

New York, Nov. 16.—By the Canadian ress.—Reports of further curtailment f production received from several oints in the United States this morning indicate that the industrial slump, which first was registered in the New England textile manufactures, is continuing to spread. Statements from representatives of several large plants today were to the effect there is a probability that some mills, now working on part time, may be closed down entirely in the near future. Reports from Montana today tell of the cutting down of the working forces of various mines, while Philadelphia dispatches state that the Pennsylvania Raliroad is still laying off men at the rate of several hundred per day. Since the end of October there has been a total net reduction of over 10,000 employees of this system. ndicate that the industrial elu

Further curtailment of production by New England textile mills are reported, while factories turning out other lines of merchandise have within recent days been compelled to cut down the working days or lay off hands.

Hits Food Production.

The curtailment of production has eventually hit food products, several Kansas flour mills having reduced their output, because other mills, using Canadian wheat, which they were in a position to secure at a lower price, were able to undersell them. The court of industrial relations is now holding an inquiry into the curtailment by the Kansas mills, which are reported to be running at only about two-thirds capacity.



George Rhallis Called Upon to Form New Ministry.

250 ROYALISTS WIN

Leader of Opposition Declares Grecian Policy to Remain Unchanged.

RHALLIS REFUSES. Paris, Nov. 16 .-- An Athens dispatch received here this noon sald It had been announced that the Opposition leaders in Greece had declded to intrust the formation of a cabinet to George Rhallis, but as he had refused to undertake the task it was believed former Premer Venizelos would head the new gov-

MARTIAL LAW FEARED.
Athens, Nov. 15.—Troops fired from a number of points on several occasions today to disperse afterelection trouble makers. Tonight there are fears of further trouble which may lead to martial law, and there is said to be danger that the army may get out of hand.
The stores, banks and theatres were closed today and soldiers patrolled the streets. Tonight the population was keeping close, not taking the risk of leaving their homes.

Athens, Nov. 16.—Premier Venizelos' cabinet resigned early today, and Admiral Coundourotis, the regent of Greece, has sent for George Rhallis, to whom, it is expected, will be intrusted the formation of a new ministry.

The complete victory of the Opposition seemed almost certain last night, although final results were still lacking. seemed almost certain last night, although final results were still lacking. Even leaders of the elements opposed to Premier Venizelos in the elections held on Sunday were surprised by the showing their candidates had made in Macedonia and Attaca.

It is said Venizelos will leave the country, and he has advised Liberals to abide by the verdict of the people.

Demetrios Gounaris, leader of the Opposition, has declared the foreign policy of Greece will not be changed.

Latest returns from the election give the supporters of M. Venizelos 118 deputies against 250 Royalists. M. Venizelos and all but two of his ministers were beaten. None of the Venizelist candidates were elected in Greece and Macedonia, with the exception of Epirus and the Aegean Islands.

TROUBLE FEARED AS RESULT OF DEFEAT

Paris, Nov. 16.—Reports that Premier Venizelos of Greece met defeat in the elections held on Sunday came as an unpleasant surprise to Paris. Newspapers here agree that Great Britain and probably France will forbid the return of Former King Constantine to Greece.

RETURNS STILL COMING

Question of "Vendors" Must Be Settled by Justice Department.

[Special to The Advertiser.]
Ottawa, Nov. 16.—From present indications Christmas and New Year's in the four provinces which recently voted against the importation of liquor will be "wet" days still. The vote in Manitoba. Saskatchewan, Alberta and Nova Scotia was taken on October 25, and was emphatically in favor of drought. But so far the Government here has not even been officially notified that there was a vote, and will take no action until it is notified. After that it is discretionary on its part as to when the law shall become effective. The act provides that proclamation shall not be issued within less than sixty days of polling, and that the law shall become effective thirty days after the proclamation is issued.

The returns are still coming in to the chief election officer, Col. Biggar. They are coming slowly, and will not be gazetted until the totals for each province have been received. Then and only then will the Government take action in the matter. In the meantine there is some legal controversy regarding the existence of licensed vendors. If such vendors are deemed to be "licensed" within the meaning of the act, no province in which they exist can go dry until such licenses expire. There will have to be some conferring with the provinces on the subject.
