

Christmas Pudding.—One cup seeded raisins, one cup currants, one cup chopped suct, one cup brown sugar, one cup fine cracker crumbs, one cup flour, one teaspoon salt, nutmeg to suit, one teaspoon sold in one pint buttermilk or sour milk steam three hours in a dish, put cloth on top of dish.

Brown Sauce.—Two tablespoons butter, two tablespoons flour, one cup brown sugar, one-half grated nutmeg, two cups boiling water. Method—Melt butter, add flour and stir till smooth; mix in sugar and stir all on stove till good and brown; add bolling water and stir till smooth; when boiled a few minutes; remove from fire, add vanilla to taste and serve hot on pudding.
