Holland Eagerly Awaits Birthday

Extraordinary Preparations Made to Greet the Coming of an Heir to the Throne.

THE HAGUE, April 11.—The birth of an heir to the throne of Holland is confidently expected the coming week, and if all goes well, the outburst of popular enthusiasm will be such as has seldom been witnessed among the placid Dutch. There has been no royal birth in the Netherlands since that of Queen Wilhelmina herself, 27 years ago.

Twice before, since the marriage of "Little Wilhelmina" as the Hollanders affectionately call the queen, have the hopes of the country been raised only to be cast down again. The constant fear of the Dutch has been that the House of Orange would die out with a childless sovereign, and that Holland would pass under the rule of a German prince, and would thereby possibly become a German vassal state.

Demonstrations on a gigantic scale have been arranged, and processions, concerts and fetes will be held the country over. The school children have been given a week's holiday, and general amnesty will be proclaimed for certain classes of prisoners. Guns already are in position on the parade grounds here for the firing of a salute.

The queen's apartments are situated at the back of the palace, overlooking a quiet, old world garden. A suite of six rooms has been prepared for the infant by the queen herself, and in these have been installed some ancient chandeliers of the House of Nassau, of wonderful workmanship. All, however, have been discarded in favor of a homely wooden Dutch cradle, which will be used ordinarily, while on state occasions the baby will occupy a beautiful cradle of Louis the 14th style, which was made at the Hague School of Lacework, where the two-sons women instructors and pupils may many months in producing the lace for this cradle.

Two rooms are literally filled with costly presents, which have been sent for the royal baby from every city and hamlet in the Netherlands.

Receptes For Tuesday.
Okra Soup.
One chicken, half cupful salt pork fat, sliced onions, two cupful strained tomatoes, twelve sliced okra pods, one teaspoonful safflower powder, seasoning of salt, and cayenne. Dress the fowl and cut in pieces for serving. Pour pork fat into frying pan when hot, add onion, chicken nicely seasoned, cook until brown and tender, add tomatoes and okra, cook for another hour.

Orange Salad.
Peel six oranges, remove as much of the white skin as possible. Slice in very thin slices. Mix six tablespoonfuls of olive oil, three tablespoonfuls vinegar and quarter teaspoonful salt, pour over oranges; let stand thirty minutes. Remove oranges, pour over them half a cupful port wine and one teaspoonful sugar. Stand in refrigerator one hour. Serve on shredded lettuce.

PASTOR RUSSELL'S SERMON

Sermon on "The Risen Christ, Head and Members," in Tremont Temple, Boston—Text, "If then ye be risen with Christ, seek those things which are above, where Christ sitteth on the right hand of God."—Col. iii, 1.

Notwithstanding the fact that our word Easter is of heathen origin and was originally applied to the queen of heaven, we may perhaps be reminded that this name is but a banish the thought of Easter as it has now developed before the Christian mind in commemoration of our Lord's resurrection from the dead. With the word Easter let us pray and seek to understand the full importance of the great resurrection event. Our Lord's resurrection may be viewed from three different standpoints, all of them interesting.
