Alsike Clover Market Is Uncertain Yet

Buyers of Canadian Seed Are Holding Off Till Demand Strengthens in Germany—Interviews With Dealers and Some Prices That Have Already Been Paid.

Editor World: "I noticed an article in your issue of August 7, regarding the yield of alsike clover seed in Ontario, which is misleading in so far as it infers that the whole Ontario yield is good, because it has turned out well in the Whitby district.

"I live in Halton County, and own a clover mill and thresh in Trafalgar, Nelson and Beckett Townships, in Halton and in Toronto Township, in Peel County, and have reports from other threshers who state that the yield is very poor. One farmer threshed half a day to get a bag of seed. Another farmer got only ten bags off thirty acres. Another received only two bushels per acre. I am interested in the alsike clover seed business as I have 100 acres of my own and I think it will make a difference in the price if the dealers think it is turning out all over the province as it is in Whitby.

"The eastern part of Halton and the western part of Peel County grow large quantities of alsike every year. Charles McGee, of Halton County, writes: 'The above letter has been received by The World, and there are hundreds of farmers in central Ontario who are getting anxious about the price that is to be paid at the opening of the market. Other sections of the country have been heard from, and so far the Halton County correspondents' yields are the lowest on record this year.

"The World did not judge the whole Ontario output by an isolated yield from Whitby, but from general reports.

"Regarding the alsike situation, the following facts are gleaned. Messrs. Wm. Hennie Company, upon being interviewed, say:

"Last year Ontario buyers started out with big figures from new alsike and went ahead in the market. Prices, so that when the German markets opened we were not able to unload easily at those prices. Thus dealers on this side had a large quantity of seed on hand. This has made Ontario buyers rather shaky about investing at high prices this season.

"We are receiving samples daily and as yet we can not announce a market price. It may open at six dollars, at six and a half, or at seven dollars. It is hard to say, but so far we cannot quote a figure for the market yet and we have not bought a pound. We can go out to one section and buy 10,000 bushels tomorrow."

FALL WHEAT DID WELL

SAYS THE GOVT. REPORT

An Average of 23 1/2 Bushels in Ontario—July Estimates of Spring Wheat Yield.

The census and statistics office reports field crops and livestock not uniformly good, but they denote on the whole a very satisfactory condition for all parts of the Dominion. Timely rains at the end of June and frequent showers throughout July proved to be very helpful, and there are only a few localities where all crops are under the average.

Fall wheat has done well in parts of Ontario where it is chiefly grown; it was cut early and gathered in fine condition. Reports of threshings already made show an average of 23 1/2 bushels per acre, and the estimated average for the province is 23 1/2 bushels for an area of 551,000 acres. Ontario is growing a considerable quantity of fall wheat, and there fully one-third of the area sown was killed by the hard weather. The 50,000 acres harvested had an estimated yield of 23.40 bushels per acre.

It was too early at the end of July to get an estimate of the spring wheat for the marketing provinces, but for Quebec, Ontario, Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, with an area of 7,022,800 acres in spring wheat, the estimated yield is 22.07 bushels per acre, which makes an aggregate of 159,622,000 bushels of spring and fall wheat in five provinces. They show a total of 176,220,000 bushels grown on 7,842,800 acres. Last year the area in wheat in the same provinces was 8,610,000 acres and the estimated yield at the same date was 139,268,000 bushels.

"For Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta the estimated yield this year is 157,464,000 bushels, and last year at the same date it was 110,524,000 bushels.

A GOOD FARM FOR SALE.

In this issue Timothy O'Leary of Pickering Township, Ontario County, offers for sale his valuable 10-acre farm on the Appleton Road. Mr. O'Leary, who has lived some time ago, has no sons to aid him, and being up in years, he has decided to sell his farm. The house has a full basement, and other out-buildings are very serviceable, while hard and soft water is abundant. Two acres of orchard of various fruit trees are well bearing nicely. The land is in a good state of cultivation, and will grow wheat to-day that will easily go sixty bushels to the acre and all the crops are good. The soil is a clay loam, well drained and fertile. About seventy acres are workable. The balance consists of pasture and creek, where a never failing spring makes stock raising easy.

The farm is situated within half a mile of the postoffice, and about two miles from Whitby Town. The late Mrs. Neale of Claremont was a tenant on this farm for years at a rental of \$425 per year, and she claimed he made more money there than on any other farm he tried. So the farm must be all right.

Good Export Trade In Light and Heavy Cattle
