LALLY HAD NOTHING LEFT BUT TO RESIGN

Cornwall, July 19.—The National Lacrosse Union of Canada is now without a chief executive officer, as today P. J. Lally of this town tendered his resignation as president of the union to Desse Brown, the recretary, at Montreal.

To some of the clubs in the union, Mr. Lally's retirement is a matter of regret; but, outside the union, it is manifestly more so, for some of the best sportgrand. but, outside the union, it is manifestly more so, for zome of the best sportsmen in all parts of Canada have upheld his action in letters and telegrams to him, and, above all this, he has the consciousness of knowing that he acted according to the constitution of the union in first expelling George Roberts and afterwards refusing to reinstate him when asked to do so by the Shamrocks, for the constitution makes the president's ruling on C. E. Made absolutely final. Mr. Lally could not so back on his original ruling and maintain decorum in the league, for there would surely be a flow of appeals following every rule if he receded from his stand. For this reason, he refused the reinstatement of Roberts when whe league met to rearrange matters after the dropping out of the Tecumsehs, and the result was an upheaval in lacrosse, which for a time threatened to send the game into oblivior.

Mr. Lally's resignation is short and to the point, he merely stating that in view of the Shamrocks playing Roberts against the Nationals last Saturday, in defiance of his ruling, ne has no other course to pursue but to resign the presidency, the expresses regret that the Shamrocks followed a course such as they did in playing Roberts, he being of the opinion that the act will prove a detriment to the game of lacrosse.

At Thorncliffe Park

Everything Ready for Seven Days' Meeting-Opening Tomorrow.

Racing goes into suspension just as the best-designed track in Canada has been brought into commission. The new Thorncliffe plant will be sufficiently completed this evening for the seven-day meet scheduled to begin there tomorrow afternoon. In every respect it is well-located, has beautiful, park-like surroundings, good approaches, and the course itself is wide, level, of excellent ground texture for the contending horses. A big grandstand covers a well-lighted betting ring.

There is good stabling, a siding for loading and unloading horses, and the resources of the Canadian Pacific for running race trains to and from the centres of the city—after the war. But for this meeting the crowd must go by motors or by street cars and litneys. There is a well-paved road by Merton street from Yonge into the concrete pavement on McRae drive, in Leaside; and then by a new cindered road for a mile into the public enclosure.

The street car service will be up Yonge to Woodlawn terminal, where jitneys will be available for the rest of the way.
