
Ontario. Dean Bosworth Tells Trials That

To Henry Drummond until his university days, Jesus was merely a doctrinal figure. To realize that "Christ learned obedience thru the things that he suffered." This was the message of the preacher. He emphasized the fact that to produce character strenuous discipline is absolutely essential. Character does not result from a mere accredited birth. The different experiences thru which our Lord passed and which taught im obedience, were then traced. The daily trials of ordinary family life, the leadership placed upon him, the increasing burden of the sins of men-finally his decision to sacrifice himself -these were all character-making experiences in the life of our Lord. As a result of Jesus' perfect subunission to God, He has become the perfect expression of God, and the
