## THE WEATHER

Meteorological Office, Toronto, Feb. 13. (8 p.m.)—Depression which was over Alabama last night has now reached the Maritime Provinces, with considerably increased energy, while the cold wave, which was moving into the western provinces from the north, is now centred in Manitoba. Snow and ice have fallen heavily in the Maritime Provinces, accompanied by strong winds and gales. A few light local snowfalls are reported from Ontario and Quebec.
