The above, with the exception of Shelburne grant, were understood to be for three years from January 1st, 1874.

With reference to the application from the Rev. Theo. Richey, it was resolved—

“That under the peculiar and exceptional circumstances attending the position of Mr. Richey, during two years in which all aid had been withdrawn from the mission of Kentville, a grant of two hundred dollars be made to Mr. Richey in order to relieve him in part from the loss sustained, but that this action of the committee can in no way be regarded as a precedent.”

FEB. 20, 1874.—The auditors for 1873 reported that they had examined the accounts and found them correct and satisfactory.

Messrs. W. H. Wiswell and W. Gossip were appointed auditors for 1874.

MARCH 20, 1874.—The following recommendations were made by the “Quebec Scheme” Committee and adopted.

A grant of \$100 from the first of January, 1874, to Weymouth on condition of \$200 being paid in accordance with rules by the people.

A special grant of \$200 to Amherst mission for one year from April 1st next, on condition that \$100 be paid by the people; with the understanding that the missionary drawing the grant reside in such place, other than Amherst, as the Bishop may direct.

A sub-committee was appointed to frame resolutions expressing the sentiments of the Society relative to the loss sustained by the death of the Very Rev. the Dean, and the Hon. Judge Bliss, two Vice-Presidents of the Society, and to send copies of them to the families of the deceased.

To fill up the vacancies caused by the death of the Dean and Judge Bliss on the W. & O. Fund Committee, the following were appointed:—The Rev. J. Abbott, and Fredk. Allison, Esq.
