Financial and Commercial

THE WALL STREET MARKETS REVIEWED BY J. S. BACHE & CO.

The Panic—What Saved the Day—The Bargain Hunter—The Money Situation—A Last Word—The Market.

NEW YORK, March 22.—The security market has been through one of the most distressing periods in its history. For a precedent to the conditions existing on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of last week, we must delve into the misty past even to the stirring times of the memorable "Black Friday," in 1869. Although we have progressed wonderfully since those memorable times in financial strength, systematic handling and operations of the machinery of Wall street, still, for severity of liquidation, extent of fall in prices, and extensive demoralization, few panics can equal the days of last week. The causes which brought about the panic are hidden in a veil of mystery. The fact that the best financial writers, together with high banking and stock market interests disagree as to the actual causes of last week's "debacle," leads to the designation of the episode in financial history as the "Mystery Panic of 1907."

WHAT SAVED THE DAY.
After prices had closed Thursday, demoralized at the low levels without a ray of hope left to the long holders of stock, the critical situation demanded immediate and emphatic action on the part of the powerful banking interests both here and abroad. This concerted action came the next day, and unfolded buying orders were rained in London the next morning and individual interests united in a common cause to protect their securities and stay the wave of hysterical liquidation then in full flood.

At the same time the new Secretary of the Treasury, Mr. Cortelyou, took action toward relieving the financial strain at this and other money centres of the country. The combined action of all the great powers of politics and finance stemmed the tide and the situation was safe for the time. The action of Friday's market was exciting and absorbing, but in marked contrast with Thursday's quotations. The bears were eager buyers, and security holders who had been on the defensive in financial sacrifice in Thursday's last half hour, had their confidence restored and their property held for their intact.

THE BARGAIN HUNTER.
Not alone was support given by the powerful and the wealthy, but the discriminating seekers after bargains came down to the street in pairs, groups, and by the thousands. Their discrimination was marked and decided. Dividend paying railroads and industrials showing from 5 to 7 per cent yield at current prices were picked up with avidity. The instabilities that have been the wonder of the stock during the week. Transfer offices of railroad companies and industrial corporations have been swamped with orders for the transfer of old lots of securities. This fact is an illustration of the great American public, and the generally prosperous conditions of the business world outside of the confines of Wall

street. The market has moved within a radius of 10 to 15 points since the great panic and its resultant rebound. But levity is not to be taken. The market is gradually disappearing and there is a tendency toward a more normal state of activity and movement.

THE MONEY SITUATION.
The bank statement Saturday was a surprise, inasmuch as, according to the known movements of currency a heavy decrease in reserves and a resultant loss in cash was expected, but the enormous liquidation of stocks brought about heavy reduction in the loan account, with an actual increase in the surplus reserve account. Since Friday the public have availed themselves largely of his offering to advance payment of the short term 4 1/2 per cent, to the amount of seven millions of dollars. This, together with the deposit of government customs in the banks since Friday, has no sub-treasury, has increased largely the available funds in the banks. The Bank of France advanced its discount rate on Thursday, but the Bank of England's rate remained unchanged. Foreign exchange has declined to a point to attract gold from the other side, but the strengthening London's bank position deters our foreign bankers from initiating gold importations.

A LAST WORD.
With the approach of springtime comes the question as to the future of the growing crops. The crop statistician, H. Jones has just issued a report on winter wheat. He states that an ideal condition exists in Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas. Upon the crops depend our real national prosperity and development, and for a long pull we believe prices will follow closely the conditions of the growing crops.

THE MARKET.
The low level to which prices have fallen in our opinion discounts the very worst that can happen in the way of decreased earnings due to shrinkage of stock and market activities and to cancellation by the various large railroad corporations of their contemplated improvements. The investment yield of the majority of our best values of stocks, even in some instances where there is a possibility of a decrease in the dividends declared, has reached a point where in time they will be steadily absorbed by the investor.

While the market will probably continue nervous for some time to come, and perhaps in some instances where the ultimate outcome of the property is in question values may decline, our opinion is that conditions make for a general increase in values for the better class of industrial and railway shares, even though little speculation is to be expected until the future of the money question is more definitely settled.

FATAL HASH

Old Soldiers Suffer From

Potomac Poisoning After

Breakfasting on "Boarding

House Mystery."

LEAVENWORTH, Kas., March 23.—More than one thousand veterans of the National Soldiers' Home here are suffering from potomac poisoning the result of eating meat hash at breakfast this morning. The first symptoms of trouble were manifested a few hours after eating. Soon the home hospital was crowded with sick veterans and the ambulances were rushing in from the barracks with loads of them. There was an apparent effort on the part of the officers to suppress the real condition of affairs which did not become known until late this afternoon.
