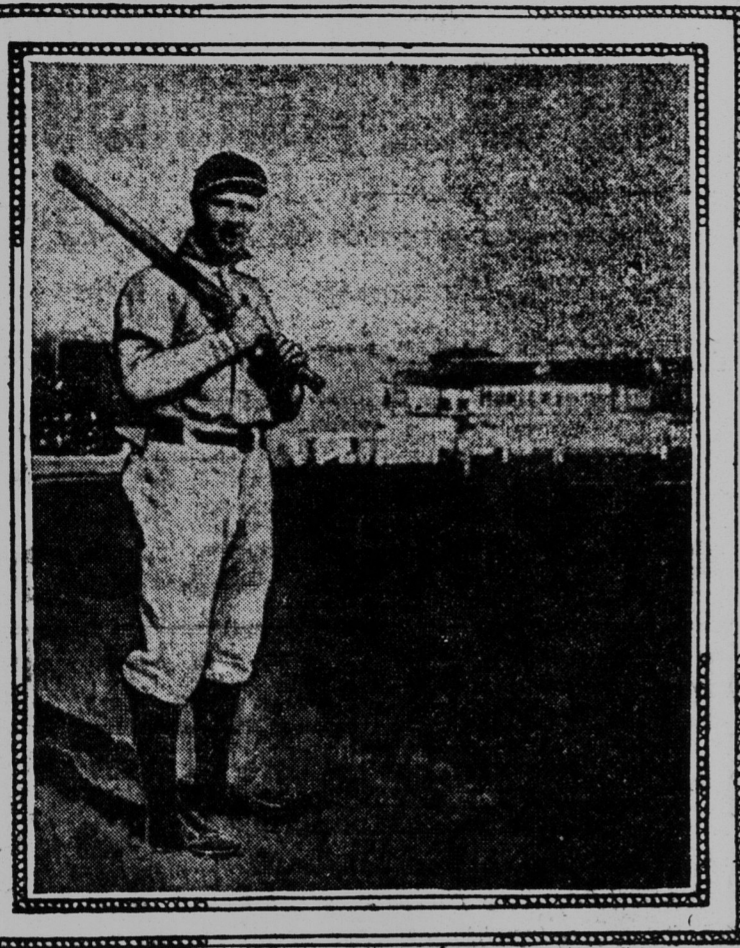


In the World of Sport.

CHICAGO, Ill., June 10.—Nothing could indicate better the provincialism and childish fondness for noise, babble and horse play which exists in this city than the reception extended to the Giants by the enthusiasts of the West Side. There was an element of ferocity to it, the result of the living accounts that were sent to Chicago in regard to the games that were played in New York, but fortunately they were not allowed to get out of hand.

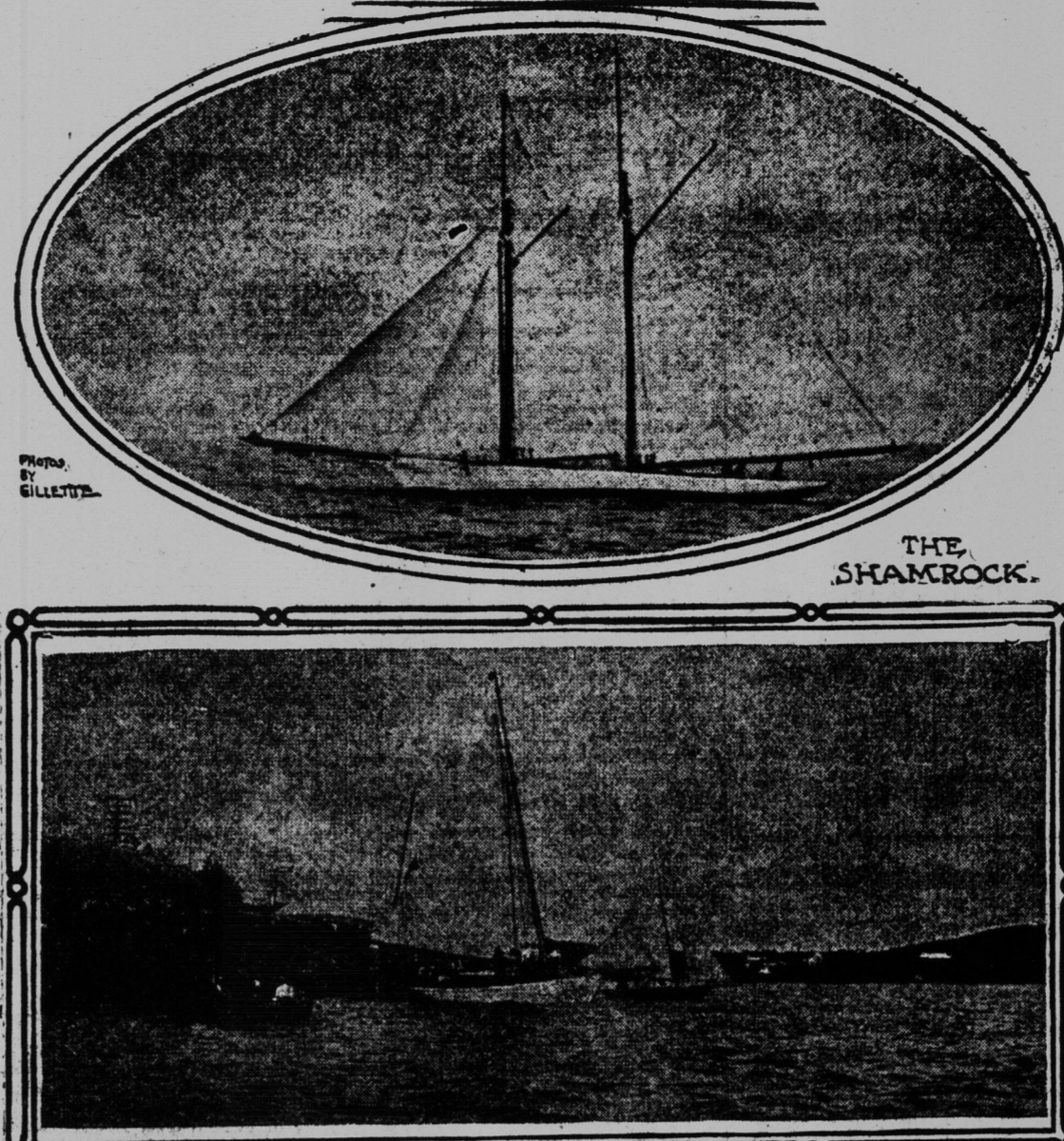

MONCTON ROAD RACE. MONCTON, N. B. June 9.—John H. Evans, aged seventeen, the smallest competitor participating, won the Y. M. C. ten mile road race Saturday afternoon in one hour, three minutes, forty-four seconds, finishing half a minute ahead of the runner-up, Louis Donnelly. Arthur Ripley was third, Edward Meade fourth, and T. H. O'Brien, fifth.

Twelve competitors started, but only five finished. Ten turned at the half-way flag, but five of these dropped out before the end of the ten miles. The race was over a fairly level course. Nearly all of the competitors were untried men. The only starter who laid claim to long distance running having been in a twenty-five mile road race in England, fell out after a mile and a half of the distance had been traveled.

THE YACHT ZEINA AT BERMDUDA ABOUT TO SAIL FOR NEW YORK.

HAMILTON, Bermuda, June 9.—The schooner yacht Dervish, owned by H. A. Morse, of the Corinthian Yacht Club, Marblehead, Mass., one of the yachts which started in the ocean race from New York to Bermuda, June 5, reached the stake-boat at St. David's Head at 6:25 o'clock this morning.

The yawl Hyperion, owned by Rear Commodore Frank Haier, New Rochelle Yacht Club, crossed the line at 5:30 o'clock this afternoon. The Dervish completed the run of 650 miles in 91 hours and 50 minutes. The Dervish is in the class of boats that is racing for the cup by Rear Com-

modore Maser, and the Hyperion in the competition for a cup given jointly by the New Rochelle, and Brooklyn and Royal Bermuda Yacht Clubs. The crossing of the line first by the Dervish does not necessarily make her the winner, as she is compelled to concede from 45 minutes to 23 hours and 15 minutes to the other boats.
