Quimet vs. Evans

Francis Quimet, golfer, has performed so many unexcused feats on the links this last season that followers of the game repeatedly have acknowledged a craving for one big match. It is to be a reality, since Quimet is to play against Charles "Chick" Evans, the national amateur and open champion, in a thirty-six hole journey at Brimburn, on next Saturday.

At first prominent golfers attempted to arrange a seventy-two hole struggle between the young experts, the first half to be played at Brimburn and the second over some one of the New York links, but Quimet found it impossible to arrange for a furlough from his military duties lengthy enough to make such a delectable contest possible. However, Quimet will meet Evans at Boston on Oct. 27.

Boxing Carnival Planned

What looks like an attractive boxing entertainment will be held at the Manhattan A. C., New York, within a few weeks, if the plans of the officials of that organization materialize. It is announced that articles of agreement had been signed by many prominent boxers to appear against opponents to be selected later. It remains for the club officials to obtain opponents.

The boxers are Benny Leonard, world's lightweight champion; Freddy Welsh of England, former lightweight champion; Frankie Calahan, a Brooklyn boxer; Irish Patsy Cline of Harlem, Jim Coffey, the Irish heavyweight, and Sol Barber of Brooklyn. The club management is now in quest of suitable opponents for this gathering. If successful in securing opponents for all the boxers the entire card will be put on at one show, the bouts being six or six rounds' duration, to conform with the boxing commission rule forbidding more than three bouts of ten rounds each. No date has as yet been selected for the show.

Easy for Leonard

Philadelphia, Oct. 22—Benny Leonard, lightweight champion, easily defeated Eddie Wagon of this city in a six round bout here tonight. Wagon was completely outclassed, the champion landing blows apparently at will. Leonard weighed 134 and Wagon 136 pounds.

A Pitching Record

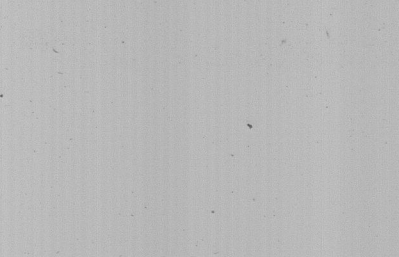
A pitching record that escaped general notice owing to the world's series excitement was made by Art Nehf of the Braves in the last few days of the National League championship campaign. Nehf went through a stretch of forty innings without allowing his opponents to score a run. After the New York Giants had failed to score on him in the final inning of the last game he pitched against them, he held St. Louis fourteen innings without a run, then Pittsburgh and Cincinnati for nine each. His next out was against Brooklyn on October 4th, when he went seven innings before the Dodgers put over a run on him. This was one of the longest stretches of unrelenting shown by a major league hurler in many years.

Evers Will Not Succeed Barry

The Rumor Factory was busy on last Friday with a yarn to the effect that President H. H. Frazee of the Boston Red Sox was preparing to engage John J. Evers to succeed Jack Barry, who has enlisted as a yeoman in the navy. Frazee promptly denied the report, declaring that Barry would be re-engaged and that he expected the latter would be permitted to handle the former world's champion's next year. Should Barry be called over to active service, however, the management of the Red Sox would be turned over to Richard Hoblitzel, the veteran first baseman of the team. Frazee, it is said, has no idea of making another offer to William Carrigan, who is a free agent and is able to receive a proposition from some other American League club. Evers, as already told in this column, has been highly recommended to Col. Rupert of the Yankees, who may have a talk with the famous Trojan in the near future.

REPRISALS
HAVE BEGUN

Home Secretary's Announcement
in Commons—Inquiry into North Sea Affair

London, Oct. 22.—In the House of Commons yesterday Sir George Cave, home secretary, said that Friday night's raid on the coast of England, which was followed by the capture of the Zeppelin, was a most serious blow to the country. He said that the government was determined to take the most effective measures to protect the coast, and that the navy was keeping watch along the coast, and that supplies were pouring in from across the sea. Other achievements of the ministry which were emphasized were the strengthening of the country's diplomatic position by the foreign minister's visits to Paris and London and the favorable developments in the economic situation, wages having advanced with the great increase in industrial activity due to the satisfaction of war needs. The food situation was described as good, in view of the fact that rationing had become necessary only after two and a half years of war, but stress was laid upon the necessity for co-operation by the United States, especially in supplying wheat to make up the deficiency of the last harvest.

TELL OF ITALY'S STRENGTH

Rome, Oct. 22.—The debate in parliament of the country has developed statements to the effect that the army, strengthened by its series of victories in enemy territory, was making satisfactory progress, while the power of the Austrians was steadily decreasing; that the navy was keeping untiring watch along the coast, and that supplies were pouring in from across the sea. IMPERIAL HAS TWO EXCELLENT ATTRACTIONS
Norma Talmadge in Poppy, a Deeply Interesting Film Story—Belgian Girls Give Musical Treat
Norma Talmadge, the popular Selznick star, is seen on the screen of the Imperial Theatre, this change, in her latest feature photodrama, Poppy. This is adapted from the play by Ben Tesel and John P. Ritter, which was taken from Cynthia Stockley's novel. The story is intensely dramatic throughout, dealing with the life of a young girl who graduates from druggery to refinement.
Miss Talmadge plays the part of Poppy Destin, whose life is moulded by three men, Lucie Abinger the unscrupulous, Dr. Brunsan the generous, and Evelyn Carson the lover. These persons have become known as "the three worst men in South Africa" on account of their adventures with women, but two of them prove that they are entitled to less sinister description. Through them the unique situation arises of a young woman married to a man without knowing it, while the man she loves and who loves her believes his one meeting with her was a dream.
The unravelling of this original plot is one of the most fascinating of the screen stories of the year.
The director of Poppy was Edward Jose, who knows the South African country where the scenes transpire, having been for many years a resident of that fascinating country, settling on the veldt, and in the bush, and in the incidents which make the general production absolutely true to life and dramatically convincing.
The Five Belgian Girls—refugees from Antwerp, who opened their engagement Saturday afternoon, were heard yesterday by delighted audiences. They perform artistically and with much acceptance upon the violin, grand piano, harp and cello. Their cultured appearance and exquisite gowns made their pleasing numbers all the more pleasing. These business-like little ladies were among the last to leave Antwerp before the German occupation. They belong to families who before the war were quite well to do but who depend very largely upon the work of their girls in America to keep them in the necessities at this serious period. The act was formed and suggested by the Keith headquarters in answer to a query from Antwerp and has played nearly all the 168 houses affiliated with the Keith interests. A dozen of these have been very hospitable to the Belgians who are stopping at the Royal.

INDIA PLOTTERS CONVICTED

Chicago, Oct. 23.—Gustave H. Jacobson, a wealthy Chicago real estate dealer and three co-defendants have been found guilty of conspiring to foment a revolution in India.
Judge Lavin in giving the case to the jury read the indictment and said that if one of the numerous overt acts charged had been proved by the government witnesses, the defendants should be found guilty. He said the statute under which the defendants were tried prohibits the "beginning, setting on foot, preparing or providing means for any military enterprise against the United States, or against any foreign country with which the United States is at peace."

as having come into force on the first day of April, 1917, and in this way all pensioners will be entitled to an extra check covering the difference between the pension paid since April 1 and the date on which the adjustment is made. The changes will affect the pensions of soldiers and sailors and their children, their orphan children, their dependent parents and their younger brothers and sisters. The total increase in the amount payable by Canada for pension and allowances will be approximately forty per cent. At the present time the annual expenditure involved is about \$5,000,000 a year, with the increases now authorized, Canada's outlay for pensions will be over \$7,000,000 during the fiscal year.
"A second change made is only slightly less important. It provides that disabilities shall be divided into twenty classes instead of six classes. In the future, disabled men will be certain to receive a pension based directly on the percentage of the disability which they suffer.
"A third important change is the authorization of the federal government, at the present time the unmarried man received the same pension for disability as the married man.
"The commissioners have also now been given more ample authority to provide for the maintenance of indigent and helpless soldiers and sailors such as men suffering from insanity, total paralysis, and other similar conditions. Previously, the maintenance of these helpless men devolved upon the provinces or upon private parties. In the future these men will be maintained by the federal government, no matter whether they are being cared for in a provincial or a federal institution, or by members of their own families.
