LIBERAL FACTION SUPPORTS LIQUOR CONTROL MINISTRY

To Back Government Behind Change in Dry Law, Says Pinard

TORONTO, Oct. 29.—J. A. Pinard, former member of the legislature for Ottawa east, and one of the sponsors of the manifesto which announced that a small group of Liberals would support Premier Ferguson's government control policy, said today: "The issue is the government control measure and that is what we are supporting."

"As the manifesto states, we will support any government which is behind the amendment to the Ontario Temperance Act."

He declined to express an opinion on possible party divisions in the legislature.

PROULX STAND

T. Proulx, former Liberal member for Prescott, said: "The situation with me is that I am not in accord with the Liberal leader on the liquor question. If I can agree with the policy of Mr. Sinclair at a later date than I can with that of Mr. Ferguson, I will support Mr. Sinclair."

Mr. Proulx pointed out that his constituency was on the Quebec border, "where possibly I see more abuses under the prohibition system than some of the other counties do."

WETS WON'T CANVASS

TORONTO, Oct. 29.—It is declared there will be no organized canvass on the part of the Moderation League of Ontario, such as there was during the plebiscite campaign in 1924. "This is the government's campaign and not ours," the secretary, B. E. Randle, said today. "We will take no active part. Any efforts put forth will be in the nature of educational propaganda."

NICKLE URGES DEFEAT

OTTAWA, Oct. 29.—If the electors of Ontario will rise above party politics and seriously consider the effect of the Ferguson liquor policy there is no doubt of its defeat, writes W. F. Nickle, of Kingston, who resigned the portfolio of attorney-general of the province on this issue.

Mr. Ferguson's policy, if approved, will lead to disaster in which I did not care to share," Mr. Nickle declares in a letter to J. Moffatt Boss, of this city, replying to a note from Mr. Boss conveying appreciation of his action.

ESCAPE DROWNING

Two Chipman Men Cling to Logs as Raft Breaks Under Them

CHIPMAN, Oct. 29.—Tom Stewart and Calvin Glenn had a narrow escape from being drowned in the Salmon River during the recent freshet, the raft on which they were crossing the stream being broken up. They held on to a few logs, fearful every moment of being carried off by the strong tide into Grand Lake. A change in the wind, however, drove them toward the shore, which they reached by wading. The mills of Saxe & Holly and the King Lumber Company were unable to save on account of the unusual height of the water in the river.

The associated growers of British Columbia were the successful competitors and having repeated this winning for the third time became the permanent possessors of the Apple General's Silver Challenge Cup.

BISHOP OPPOSES STANZA OF HYMN

Part of "Come Holy Spirit" Not Suited to Be Sung in Church, He Says

GROTON, Conn., Oct. 29.—The second stanza of the hymn "Come Holy Spirit, Heavenly Dove," doesn't meet with the approval of Right Reverend E. Campion Acheson, bishop coadjutor of the diocese of Connecticut. "This hymn is not suited to be sung in a Christian church," said the bishop after listening to the second verse on a recent visit to the Seabury Memorial church here, "and I hope that it will never again be sung in my presence." The stanza to which the bishop takes exception is:

"See how we grovel here below, 'Fond of these earthly toys; 'Our souls, how heavenly they go 'To reach eternal joys."

EVANGELIST DENIES OWNING APPAREL

Says Gowns and Dresses Found in Ormiston's Trunk Aren't Hers

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Oct. 29.—Aimee Semple McPherson, Angelus Temple evangelist, whose preliminary hearing on conspiracy charges ended yesterday, today positively denied that any of the gowns and women's wearing apparel found in the trunk of the Ormiston's trunk in New York belonged to her. She characterized as "ridiculous" any intimation that the apparel was hers.

Mrs. McPherson also bitterly denounced those who would connect her with the clothing found in the trunk and defied authorities to prove that any of the expensive robes, gowns or slinky lingerie ever wore her property.

Mrs. M. McPherson, mother of the evangelist and co-defendant in the conspiracy charges, seconded Mrs. McPherson's denial.

LORD COWLEY FAILS TO OBTAIN DIVORCE

Countess Sobs and Denies Misconduct; Jury Backs Her

LONDON, Oct. 29.—Lord Cowley, known on the stage as Arthur Wellesley, today lost his suit for divorce against his wife, formerly Miss May Pickard, an actress.

Lord Cowley charged the countess with misconduct with Humphrey Kent, an actor. Both the countess and Mr. Kent denied the allegation, and a jury found that there had been no misconduct.

The countess took the stand this afternoon. She sobbed as she denied that she had been intimate with the respondent. She also denied that she ever indulged in liquor, as well as the allegation that she had threatened to visit the theatre where her husband was playing and shoot him. She said Lord Cowley allowed her £200 a month for housekeeping money and testified that in her belief he brought the divorce suit for financial reasons. She admitted that he told her he had ceased to love her.

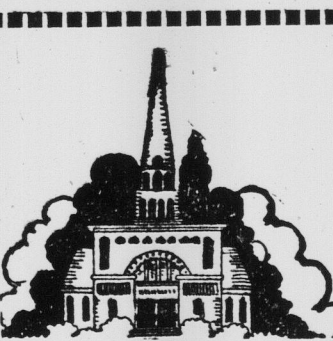
