16,000 HOUSES ARE FLOODED IN KOREA

Fifteen Lives Lost Within Last Twenty-four Hours

Canadian Press. CHICAGO, July 14—Hot weather, lightning and drownings took a toll of upwards of 15 lives in the middle west during the last 24 hours, while dry weather in some sections and severe storms in others caused a crop and property loss of several hundred thousand dollars.


