Montreal, April 12.—The sensation of a case heard here yesterday, in which Frank H. Dunn is on trial, charged with stealing \$38,000 and falsifying checks from the Connaught Park Jockey Club, occurred.

SHOT AFTER WINNING \$50.
Utica Fireman Leaves Game Lucky, Meets Robber, May Die.

Utica, N. Y., April 12 — Michael Jones, 30 years old, a fireman employed at the Utica State Hospital, made a successful "pass," which netted him \$50, in a gambling game.

Jones' luck, however, did not stick. An hour later, on his way home, he was held up and probably fatally shot in the spine. He lies at death's door in a local hospital with little more than a fighting chance.

U. S. STEEL OUTPUT STILL BEHIND ORDERS.
The United States Steel Corporation had unfilled orders on its books at the end of March of 7,468,822 tons, an increase of 119,848 tons compared with the end of February. This is the largest amount of forward business United States Steel has had since the end of January, 1921.

Seven Australians Will Enter Swim

Governing Organization Decides to Send Delegation to the Olympic Games.

Seven swimmers will be sent by Australia to the Olympic Games in Paris next year. The decision was reached at the annual conference of the Olympic Swimming Union of Australia at Adelaide recently. It was voted also to increase the number if the necessary funds can be raised, but a representation of seven is assured. The team will consist of four free style swimmers who will take part in the individual events and 800-metre relay race, one candidate for each of the breast and back stroke contests and one high diver. While the selection of contenders will not be made until next spring, when qualifying trials are to be held, the present champions displayed such clean cut superiority in the recent title tests that there is every indication they will prove the backbone of the international squad. Australian experts predict confidently that the places will be earned by Andrew Charlton, Frank Beaurepaire, William Herald, Moss Christie, J. Soussari, Keith Kirkland and Dick Eve, unless some star of exceptional ability steps to the fore meanwhile.

With the foregoing men Australia counts on reaping a good share of honors. Charlton is regarded as the logical favorite for the 1,500-metre swim and a strong bidder for laurels at 400 metres, in virtue of his striking achievement in lowering the world's record for 880-yards to 11:08 1-5 over a 110-yard course at Sydney early this year. Beaurepaire is considered a likely scorer in both these races also for he displayed world's record speed at one mile in Honolulu a year ago and won the Australian championship under unfavorable conditions in 24:29 3-4 last month. Christie, who has been improving rapidly and holds the three-quarter mile title, is thought a possible point winner at 1,500 metres.

Australians are not sanguine concerning the prospects of Kirkland, the back stroke swimmer, who has not approached the times of American leaders, but they have hope that Soussari, the breast stroke champion, may work into the awards. They believe that Eve, who outclasses all divers in his own country, has developed to the point of putting up a telling fight in high platforms and springboard tests.

The question of sending girl swimmers to the coming Olympic was discussed at the same meeting, but the feeling prevailed that the outlook was not sufficiently promising to warrant the heavy expense. Should some fair champion of international rating come to light next season, arrangements will be made to include her. Otherwise no funds for the purpose will be appropriated by the association, though it is possible that a couple of their own expense, or with the help of their own clubs, Miss Elsie Venning of Queensland, credited with a 100-yard breast stroke swim in 1:27 4-5, and an able exponent of the back stroke, is mentioned as one of them.

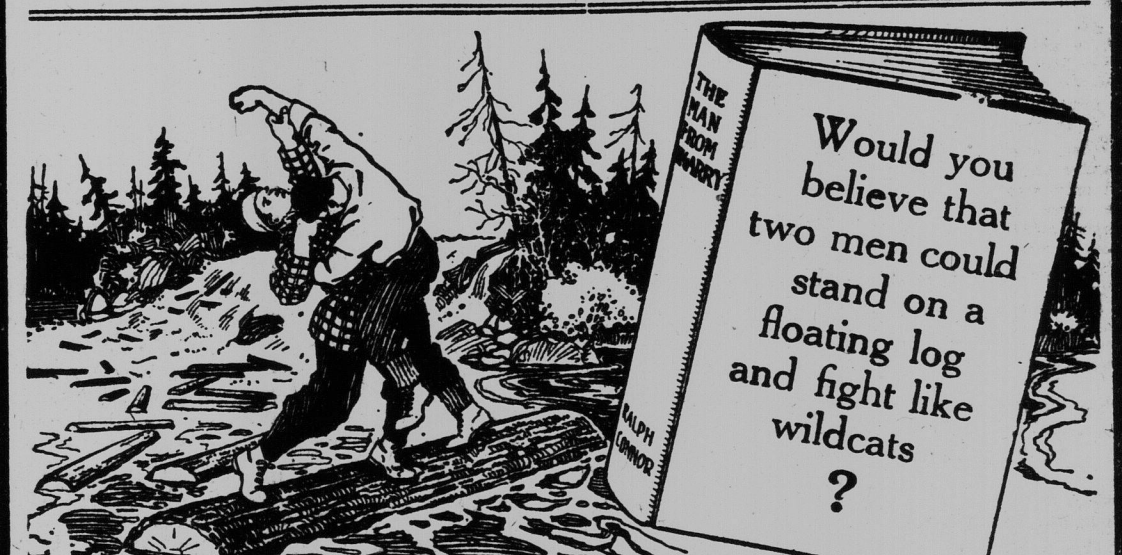
CHAMPION SWIMMER DROWNS.
