Big Irish Drama Will Be Presented by St. Peter's Dramatic Club—Feature Attraction for St. Patrick's Day.

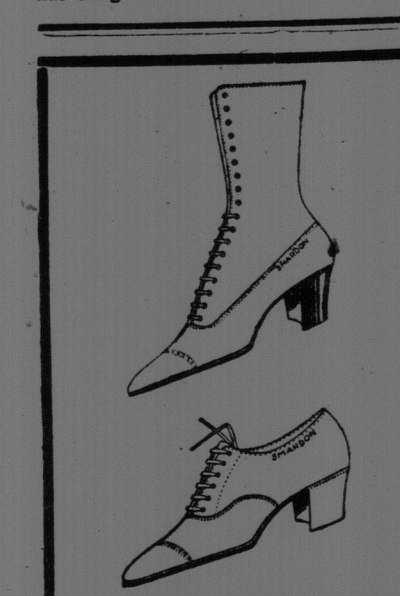

Williston, missionary from China, conducted the church services and addressed the Sunday school and Bible classes.

Rev. Dr. W. F. Parquhar, port chaplain, occupied the pulpit of Knox church in the morning. The Carleton Methodist church service was held in the morning with Rev. H. B. Clarke of the Portland church. In St. Andrew's church the minister, Rev. F. S. Dowling, in his evening sermon described and explained Ford Madox Brown's picture, "Christ Waiting Peter's Feet." The message of the picture, he said, was a foregleam of the Cross. A copy of the painting was given to every one present at the service, in order that they might follow the description more readily.

In a service of song in the school-room of St. David's church after the evening service last night Murray Lawson was the chairman and Mrs. J. M. Barnes was the pianist. There was a large gathering and the singing was very hearty. Miss Phyllis MacGowan, as soloist, delighted everyone.

Rev. W. B. Williston of West China, was the preacher at both services in Mary's church yesterday and in the morning took for his text, "But They Could Not." A feature of the evening service was the large number of boys and girls who took part in the singing.

## WOMAN DEFEATS THE GENERAL IN ELECTION

Perth, Australia, March 14.—Mrs. J. M. Cowan, a candidate in the state elections, has defeated the attorney-general for his seat in parliament. She is the first woman to be elected to membership in the Australian parliament.

Sydney, N. S., March 14.—Sydney's Chinese colony has just forwarded \$1,000 to assist the famine sufferers in their native country, so Wong Goo, a local leader said yesterday. All the local Chinese came from Canton and their home district has not been affected.

## EXECUTIONER IN RED ROBE CUTS OFF THEIR HEADS

Berlin, Feb. 23.—(A. P. by mail)—A grim reminder of the fact that the guillotine still is used in Germany for the infliction of the death penalty is given in the sentencing of Engelbert Manns to die by that instrument for the murder of Edward Golding, an American soldier. Manns killed the American in order to rob him, and was sentenced to death by the German court.

Executions, once carried out in the market place before the populace are attended by the police and most harm, the judge before whom the case has been tried, sometimes the jury, and those invited by the judge.

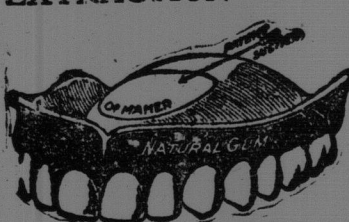

## MARINE NOTES.

A splendidly equipped four-masted schooner which had been a familiar craft in St. John harbor during the last three years, like several other comparatively new vessels which have sailed out of this port, has met an untimely fate. On Saturday evening the firm of Nudge & Wigmore, agents for the Frieda E., received a wireless message to the effect that she had been abandoned on the sea and that her crew had been rescued.

## OTTAWA MINT HELPED IN WAR

London, Feb. 24.—(By Mail)—In a paper on "The Mint and Precious Metals of Canada," read before the Royal Statistical Society, J. Bonar, L.L.D., lately deputy master of the Ottawa mint, said that although the Ottawa mint was originally expected to do little but turn out small change, it had proved unexpectedly useful during the war. The Bank of England sent South African gold to Ottawa to be turned into fine bars, which were sent to J. P. Morgan at New York, to pay British debts. Gold from South America and Borneo worth \$72,000,000 at the mint price, was treated in the same way, the dangers of transmission to London being thus avoided. The mint also turned out 11,889 daily rights, and 20,198 brackets of eye pieces for large guns, and supplied 6,000,000 shilling blanks, when the home mint was hard pressed.

## ACCIDENT FATAL

Charlottetown, P.E.I., March 13.—Benjamin Compton, aged sixty-six, of Belle River, who lost an eye and whose face was injured by being struck with a hammer in his mill last week, died in the Prince Edward Island hospital yesterday.

William Thomas, who arrived in the city a few days ago from England en route to Toronto where he intended to join his brother, died on Saturday evening in the General Hospital, where he had been taken from the vessel suffering with pneumonia.

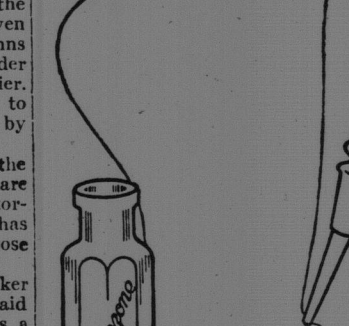

## HOW TO ECONO- MIZE IN COAL

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ROYAL ONTARIO MUSEUM.  
Toronto, March 14.—By the recent appointment of Sigmund Samuel to the board of trustees of the Royal Ontario Museum, the number of members of the board reduced by the deaths of Hon. Francis Cockran and Z. A. Lash, has again been completed. The board consists of ten members, inclusive of three ex-officio—the Minister of Lands, Forests and Mines, the Minister of Education, and the Chairman of the Board of Governors of the University; these posts being filled at present by Hon. Henry Mills, Hon. R. H. Grant and Sir Edmund Walker, who is the chairman of the board.

Of the remaining members seven members four are appointed by the government, and three by the university. The government appointees now are Sir Edmund Osler, J. B. O'Brien, Mrs. H. D. Warren and Sigmund Samuel and the university appointees, Sir William Meredith, Sir Robert Falconer and Hon. Dr. H. J. Cody who has succeeded Dr. Lash.
