STALLINGS MAY MANAGE BIRONS NEXT SEASON

Cleveland, O., Oct. 15.—George Washington Grant, owner of the Boston Nationals, who attended the World Series with his Manager, George Stallings, refused to affirm or deny a rumor to the effect that he is negotiating for the purchase of the Buffalo franchise in the International League.

The story is to the effect that Grant will buy out J. J. Lannin, present owner of the Buffalo club, who wants to get out of baseball to devote his whole time to the building contracting business. Stallings is a former Buffalo manager, and it is understood that he will have a proprietary interest in the Buffalo club and manage it next season.

Boston is said to demand a change in the management of the Braves and Stallings is willing that it should be made. He wants to get away from the Hall, and is eager to return to Buffalo, where he was a favorite, and where he piloted the Braves to a pennant. Buffalo is unquestionably a good baseball town with proper handling, and the return of Stallings would be a source of satisfaction to the International League.
