THE ANNIVERSARY OF FATHER CARNEY

Of the 80th anniversary of Very Rev. F. L. Carney in the priesthood, mentioned in the Times yesterday, the Fredericton Gleason said yesterday:

"Very Rev. F. L. Carney, pastor of St. Dunstan's church in this city and dean of the diocese of St. John, is today celebrating the 80th anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood. This morning at 7.30 o'clock Very Rev. Dean Carney celebrated his anniversary mass, which was largely attended. He thanked the members of his congregation for their kind wishes when Rev. J. H. A. Holmes united in interest in him, which was shown by the large number in attendance."

"Very Rev. Dean Carney was born at Luck Lomond in June, 1839, and completed his classical studies at St. Joseph's in 1861. In 1864 he was ordained to the priesthood by the late Archbishop Fabre on Easter Saturday, Dec. 20 in Montreal. In January, 1865, he was attached to the Cathedral in St. John and in July, 1886, the late Bishop Sweeney sent him to Woodstock to assist Rev. Father Murray. In 1889 he was appointed pastor of Debec, remaining there until he was sent to this city to become pastor of St. Dunstan's church more than 20 years ago. During the summer of 1919 Father Carney's faithful services were recognized by his appointment as dean of the diocese of St. John."

A wedding of wide interest was solemnized in St. John's Church, West St. John, this morning at eleven o'clock when Rev. J. H. A. Holmes united in marriage Miss Ella M. Robson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Robson of 356 Rodney street, west end, and Arthur D. Alward, son of Mr. and Mrs. S. C. Alward of Moncton. The bride was given in marriage by her brother, J. Harry Robson, and looked charming in a traveling suit of brown durrett with French hat and guinea fur and carrying a bouquet of Ophelia roses. Mrs. Minnie Ingraham, sister of the bride, was maid of honor and looked very attractive in a suit of navy blue serge with four panels velvet hat and seal cape and wearing a corsage bouquet of sweetheart roses. After the ceremony luncheon was served at the home of the bride at which immediate relatives were present. The groom's gift to the bride was a seal coat.

Mr. and Mrs. Alward left on a honeymoon trip through Nova Scotia and on their return will reside in this city. Many beautiful presents were received in testifying to the popularity of the bride and groom. The out-of-town guests at the wedding were the parents of the groom, Mr. and Mrs. S. C. Alward, Miss Minnie and Lucy Alward, of Moncton and Mrs. T. C. Grez of St. Stephen.

ST. PETER'S TO HAVE RINK 8 LAPS TO MILE

Chance for Our Fast Skaters to Get Ready for Championship Events.

St. John speed skaters will have an opportunity this winter to train on a regulation rink, so that in event of any going to Upper Canada or the United States to compete in international championships they will not be under such a handicap as they were in the past. This was decided recently at a meeting of officials of St. Peter's Y. M. A., when plans were made to make a large open air rink. Yesterday Engineer Murdoch completed laying out a regulation rink, having eight laps to a mile. It will be 240 feet long, 90 feet around the turn and 67 1/2 feet wide. Two hundred and twenty yard events will be one lap, 440 yards two laps, half mile, four laps, and a mile eight laps.

In addition, men are now engaged erecting a dressing room and a place to check boots and wraps. The rink will be illuminated by large flare lights, which will be installed on the top of the grand stand in the near future. It is hoped to have the rink opened by the end of the year.

COURT JUDGMENTS

In two matters in the Supreme Court, Chancery Division, this morning, His Honor Judge Grimmer delivered judgment. The first case was that of George T. Barrett and Ernest M. Barrett vs. Prudential Trust Company et al. In this case a summons was issued upon the application of one of the defendants, M. B. Innes, for an order that the judgment signed and execution issued be set aside on the grounds that the notice of motion was not served upon him or other person for him and that the judgment was given for more than was due. The judgment against all of the defendants involved in this case at the original hearing amounted to \$124,618.18. The motion was dismissed with costs by His Honor this morning, he deciding that there had been sufficient service. Teed & Teed appeared for the company, and M. W. B. Wallace, K. C., for Mr. Innes.

The other matter was that of George W. Herron, plaintiff, and Henry W. Phipps and Nelson Greenlow, defendants. The plaintiff alleges that the defendants by their agents broke an entered certain of his lands at North Head, Grand Manan, and cut cordwood and various well material, thereby causing damage to the extent of about \$1000. He asked for an injunction against further cutting and for a decree for payment of damages. The defendants admitted entering the lot and cutting cordwood thereon, but said they did so by leave and license. The matter of a deed giving title to the property was brought up for judgment that the action could not be maintained by the plaintiff alone without joining other co-tenants who should have been joined, and that the co-tenant could not maintain an action in his own right against one of several others even if he had proper grounds for maintaining his action, without joining all the others who were interested in the property as co-tenants. The injunction granted was ordered discharged and the case dismissed with costs.

REV. MR. HOOPER IS BEREAVED

Receives News of Death of His Mother in Vancouver.

Many of the older people in this province will learn with sympathy of the death of Mrs. Henry Filkes Hooper, which occurred yesterday in Vancouver, B. C.

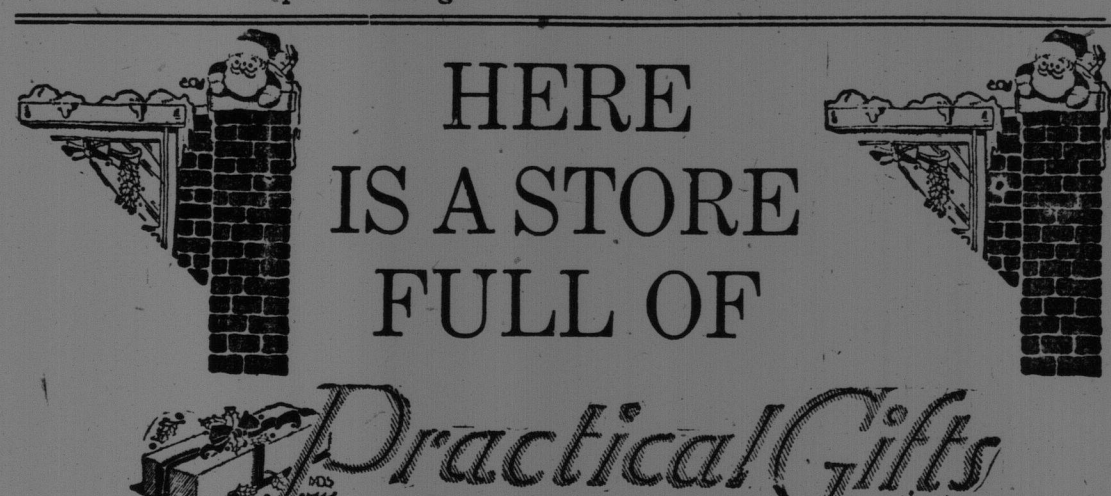
Mrs. Hooper was the widow of Capt. H. F. Hooper, late of the 76th Regiment. She was the youngest daughter of the Venerable Archdeacon Coster, rector of Fredericton for many years. She was the last of a large family. Her brother, Dr. Charles Coster, was well known in this city. Mrs. Hooper had five children, one daughter and four sons. The daughter, Mabel (Mrs. Ernest Wood), entered into rest a year ago. The four sons survive: Rev. L. W. P., superintendent of the Seamen's Institute, Vancouver; Rev. Bertram, chaplain K' unit, D. S. C. R., St. John; Rev. Hugh, rector St. John's church, New Brunswick; and Basil Hooper, chief designer in Mott & Sons' Iron Works, Newark, N. J., U. S. A.

A marconigram received yesterday said that the liner was 375 miles east of Cape Sable at 10 a. m. If the weather is favorable she should reach port by Thursday morning.
