

## London Experts Say Decisive Battle Will Be Fought at Rhine

(TODAY'S WAR SUMMARY.)  
London—Military men believe the battle of the Aisne is draw, but that steady pressure of the allies will force the Germans back until they reach the Rhine, where the decisive battle of the war will be fought.  
Paris, Oct. 6.—The battle front on the German right wing is steadily broadening, extending toward the north and northwest. German cavalry is engaged in a counter flanking movement near Lille, trying to turn back the allied attacks. The Germans were repulsed in fierce attacks near Lassigny. The allies have advanced slightly north of Soissons.  
Berlin—The Germans are continually forcing the allies back and extending the lines of entrenchment. The inner works of Antwerp are being bombarded. The Germans continue to advance against the Russians. The Russians and reinforced Austrians will meet in a gigantic battle soon.  
London—It is officially announced in Vienna that the Russians have installed their own system of local government in Galicia.  
Rome—Italian papers declare that prospective changes in the cabinet make it certain that Italy will declare war against Austria. The editorials demand that Italy throw off the bonds of the Triple Alliance.  
Antwerp—German troops attempting to storm the defences of Antwerp have been repulsed by the Belgians.

## I. C. R. BUILDING ITS OWN CARS

### Six Now Under Construction in Montreal Shops—Equipment For Other Lines

Montreal, Oct. 6.—The I. C. R. is taking up the construction of its own passenger cars. There are now under construction at the new shops in Montreal four baggage and two postal cars. They all have steel frames. The baggage cars are sixty feet over all and are fitted with Simplex four wheel trucks. The postal cars are sixty-five feet in length, and have Simplex six wheel trucks. It is said they will be the equal of any product of the regular car-building concerns.  
Engineers report the new block system between Montreal and Painesville working excellently so far.  
Recently the I. C. R. received ten passenger locomotives of the Pacific type, two switch engines, 180 box cars of 80,000 pounds capacity, and four special steel pit cars, each of 180,000 pounds capacity. The "Pacific" came from the Montreal Locomotive Works, the switch engines from the Canadian Locomotive Company and the cars from the Eastern Car Company. The road has ordered four more special pit cars from the latter concern.  
The P. E. Island Railway recently received from the I. C. R. three passenger cars and one baggage car. At Charlotteville their standard gauge trucks were changed to suit the narrow gauge of the island line.  
The Montreal and Butteville Railway recently purchased from the I. C. R. an entire train of one small locomotive, one first class car, and one combination second-class car and smoker.

## THE WAR AND AFTER

Interesting Address Before Canadian Club by Beckles Willson

"The War and After" was the subject of an intensely interesting address by Beckles Willson before the Canadian Club at Bond's at a luncheon at 1:15 this afternoon. Dr. H. S. Bridges presided, and at the close a hearty vote of thanks, moved by C. B. Allan and seconded by Sheriff Wilson, was extended to the distinguished speaker.  
Mr. Willson treated his subject from the standpoint of Canada and showed in a very clear manner the change the war has made in the status of this country and in the thought of its people. As to the results, he expressed the hope that they would include unity and discipline, and he enlarged upon what discipline had done for Germany, even when associated with wrong ideals. He showed in striking contrast the respective ideals of the German and the British, and expressed the fervent hope that if we do capture Germany's trade we will not adopt her shoddy methods or her commercial morals.  
He said that the allied countries, he said, must win this war, and destroy the virus that has caused Germany, but we should be careful to see also that it is destroyed in ourselves, and the higher ideals of nationhood and national character made triumphant.

McLean, of Montreal, have been appointed in the matter of a claim of the Hilliard Construction Company against the St. John and Quebec Railway Company. The Hilliard Company has a sub-contract for building the Valley Railway between Fredericton and Woodstock, and claims a large sum for work done which the company has declined to pay. 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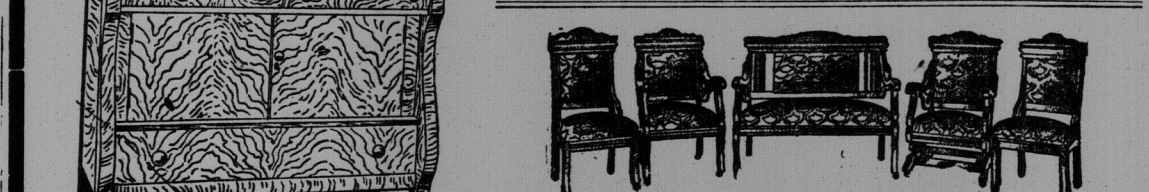
