A telegram from Brest-Litovsk to Amsterdam gives a wireless message sent to M. Joffe, chairman of the Russian delegation, by Foreign Minister Von Kuehlmann, for the German delegation; Foreign Minister Czernin, for the Austrians; Foreign Minister Nessimy Bey, for the Turkish nation, and Minister of Justice Popoff for the Bulgarians. It realizes the fact that when the Central Powers outlined the terms on which they were willing to make peace they stipulated that these terms would be valid only if all the belligerents bound themselves within a certain period to observe them. The Russians then fixed ten days as the period in which the belligerents were to decide whether to join in the negotiations, but although this time elapsed on January 4, nothing has been heard from them.

The Petrograd Post says the King of Roumania has cabled the Entente Allies that the Roumanians are determined to continue the war, notwithstanding the desires of the troops on the Russian-Roumanian front, and that M. Poincare, the French president, replied, assuring the king of France's support.

The French government has protested against the seizure of French banks in Petrograd.

Mayor J. E. Masters of Moncton, is in receipt of a telegram from Ottawa, from Sir Frederick Williams-Taylor, stating that he was in receipt of a cable-gram from the head of the Red Cross Society in Mesopotamia, regarding his son, Lieut. Travers Williams-Taylor, who was reported wounded and missing about two months ago. It is now definitely known that the young man is a prisoner in Mesopotamia, and was at that time en route to Smyrna, with a number of other prisoners.

Friday between the Germans and the Ukrainians took a direction 'avo 'able to Grmany.

A Petrograd despatch to the Daily Mail says that General Nissel, head of the French military mission, replied to Foreign Minister Trotszky's complaint respecting French military propoganda by stating that certain news received from Stockholm had been issued by a young officer by mistake. The general promised that no such mistake would be made again. M. Trotzky replied with a demand that the officer in question leave Russia.

The correspondent adds that it is a pity that some of the allied diplomats pretend to ignore M. Trotzky, while in fact they are obliged to recognize his authority.

Referring to the same incident, a Reuter despatch from Petrograd says Trotzky ordered the immediate closing of the French bureau, the removal of the wireless apparatus, and the immediate recall to Petrograd of French officers in the war area.

Armistice in Ukraine.

An armistice has been declared in the Ukraine region, the Rada, the Ukraina legislative body, and the Bolsheviki having agreed to a compromise of their differences. The Rada is said to be ready to decline to give support to General Kaledines and his Cossacks in return for the withdrawal of the Bolsheviki troops from Ukraine.
